



EXPLANATION:						
State law requires cities that have adopted juvenile curfew ordinances to conduct hearings every three years to determine whether to continue or modify the curfew restrictions. City Council last acted to continue the current City of Houston Juvenile Curfew Ordinance in May 2007. Thus, the City's current Juvenile Curfew Ordinance must be continued prior to May 9, 2010 or it will expire as a matter of law. On April 8, 2010 a joint report on this issue was presented to the Public Safety and Homeland Security Committee by the Houston Police Department Juvenile Division and the Municipal Juvenile Court. At that time the Committee voted favorably to forward to full Council the scheduling of the Public Hearings that are required by law and the consideration of the ordinance to renew the Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. On April 14, 2010 the first Public Hearing on the renewal of the Juvenile Curfew Ordinance was held before the whole Council.



The Homestead Road Grade Separation Project (Ley - Firnat) will provide for right-of-way acquisition, engineering and construction of a grade separation over the Union Pacific Railroad Company. The project will reduce delays and improve traffic circulation on the major thoroughfare.

This eminent domain proceeding involves the acquisition of a permanent easement in and to 2,852 square feet of land out of a parent tract containing 39,000 square feet. The property is located at 8103 Homestead Road and is owned by Hong C. Hoang and Luyen T. Nguyen. The property is improved with two (2) independent structures; one being a 11,239 square-foot building being utilized as a family run grocery store and the second structure is a 1,800 square-foot, five (5) bay automobile tire/detailing service shop. 



HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY

The William Fairchild House at 2911 Ella Lee Lane was built in 1936 and designed by architect Cameron Fairchild, William's brother. Fairchild designed the house in the eclectic style, incorporating Colonial Revival details.

Born in Waco, Cameron Fairchild began his architectural practice in Houston in 1925. Over the course of a long career, he became noted for his eclectic single-family houses in Houston neighborhoods such as Shadow Lawn, Boulevard Oaks, Braeswood, Riverside Terrace, and particularly River Oaks. Fairchild also designed or remodeled numerous public buildings in Houston, such as the Jesse H. Jones Library Building at the Texas Medical Center; the 14-story downtown First Savings Building; South Texas College of Law; and Trinity Church on Main Street. Fairchild was also very active in Galveston, where he designed many homes for the city's elite, and public buildings such as the seven-building student housing complex at UTMB. Beyond Houston and Galveston, Fairchild designed the Cody Memorial Library and the Lois Perkins Chapel on the campus of Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, and the Taylor Public Library in Taylor, Texas.

The William Fairchild House meets Criteria 1, 4, and 6 for Landmark designation.

HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE

The design of the house at 2911 Ella Lee Lane is attributed to Houston architect Cameron Fairchild. Although original plans have yet to be uncovered, three factors point to Cameron Fairchild as the architect. First, the home was designed for Cameron's brother, William Seley Fairchild. In 1910, the Fairchild household in Waco, Texas, included parents, DD and Tyler B. Fairchild residing with children, Ralph B., age 19, Will S., age 13, and Cameron D., age 7. Second, word-of-mouth has passed down knowledge of Cameron Fairchild as the architect through a succession of owners. Finally, a smaller version of the house at 2911 Ella Lee Lane is located at 2529 Stanmore Drive. The house at 2529

Stanmore Drive is situated on a greenway court lined with houses, all designed by Cameron Fairchild in 1936.² The Stanmore Drive home exhibits a similar side-facing entrance, L-shaped floor plan, symmetrically balanced windows with double-hung sashes and 6/6 glass lites, accentuated front door, and brick chimney located on the front eave wall. It has therefore likely that Cameron Fairchild designed the house at 2911 Ella Lee Lane.

William Fairchild was born on January 12, 1897, and was five-and-a-half years older than his brother, Cameron. William was married to the former Mae Belle Allen. In September 1935, William Fairchild is listed in the Texas General Contractor's Monthly Bulletin as hiring J.E. Braunagel to build the house at 2911 Ella Lee for \$8500. Upon moving into the home in 1936, the City Directory listed Fairchild's profession as "Oil Leases" in the Second National Bank Building. Throughout his career, and until the 1960s, the City Directory listed his profession as "Independent Oil Operator." William Fairchild later retired to Comal, Texas, where he died on January 30, 1973.

William and Mae Belle Fairchild resided in the Ella Lee home for approximately six years. Subsequent owners included, Leslie Coleman (1942, Trust Officer, National Bank of Houston); Earl English (1945, engineer); Ralph K. Alexander (1955, Regional Manager Ceco Steel); Charles H. Herder (1986); Scott and Laurie Dorfman (1996); John and Linna Mooring (2003) and currently Stacy and Andrew White since 2006.

Cameron Fairchild

According to research by Stephen Fox, Architectural Historian and Professor at Rice University, Cameron Fairchild is best known for his eclectic suburban houses. Fairchild made his reputation in the 1920s as an architect of single-family houses. He designed suburban "country houses" in the Houston neighborhoods of Shadow Lawn (City of Houston Historic District), Edgemont, Braeswood, and Riverside Terrace. In Shadow Lawn, Fairchild designed the neo-Georgian style house at 4 Shadow Lawn Circle in 1927-28 for stockbroker Joseph C. Brown and his wife Elva Trueheart.

Fairchild was especially identified with River Oaks, where he designed the Clarence O. Lamberth–James Abercrombie House at 2221 River Oaks Boulevard (City of Houston Protected Landmark) in 1928, one of the first houses built on River Oaks Boulevard. Fairchild designed five houses that the River Oaks Corporation built around the first of the River Oaks Courts to be developed on Stanmore Drive in 1936. In addition to 2221 River Oaks Boulevard, Fairchild designed 2112 Brentwood (1934, City of Houston Landmark); 3244 Ella Lee Lane; 3320 Chevy Chase Drive; and the 17-story River Oaks Apartments (1965).³

During his long career, Fairchild designed many public buildings in Houston, including the Jesse H. Jones Library Building at the Texas Medical Center (1954); the 14-story downtown First Savings Building (1964; demolished 2002); and the remodeling of South Texas College of Law. He was also responsible for numerous alterations and additions to Trinity Church on Main Street, where he was a parishioner, vestry member, and senior warden.

Fairchild also designed many buildings in Galveston. In 1928, Fairchild was commissioned by Mrs. Joseph C. Brown's sister, Sally Williams, to design a new house for her in Galveston. This led to a series of Galveston commissions from relatives and friends of Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Williams. Fairchild designed houses for Mrs. Brown's and Mrs. Williams' nephew, John Adriance II; Mrs. Williams' son-inlaw and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John W. McCullough; and for Mrs. McCullough's cousin, W. Kendall Menard. These projects in turn led to commissions in the upscale Galveston neighborhoods of Cedar Lawn, Caduceus Place, and Denver Court and on the prestigious Broadway Boulevard. During the 1930s, Fairchild designed Galveston houses for George Sealy, Jr. (1930; demolished); Edward C. Michaelis (1931); Dr. and Mrs. A. O. Singleton (1931); J. Marvin Moreland (1937); Benjamin C. Levy (1938); Louis Pauls (1938); and Ballinger Mills, Jr. (1939). He remodeled and added to the Brantly Harris House (1939) and designed the modernistic style Windsor Court Apartments for Mrs. Hans Guldman (1938). Fairchild also designed the seven-building, student housing complex at the University of Texas Medical Branch (1955) in Galveston.

Outside of the Houston-Galveston area, Fairchild was responsible for the design and supervised the construction of buildings on the campus of Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, including the Cody Memorial Library (1939) and the Lois Perkins Chapel (1948).⁵ Perhaps one of the commissions most endeared to Fairchild was the Taylor Public Library (1959) in Taylor, Texas. According to the Taylor Public Library website, Fairchild was chosen to design the library "because of his high standing in the profession of architecture and because Taylor had been the childhood home of both Mr. Fairchild and of his wife, the former Helen Tarkington."

Fairchild was born in Waco, Texas on August 20, 1902. He was educated at Southwestern University in Georgetown and the University of Texas, from which he graduated in 1924. From 1924 to 1925, he worked for the Austin architect George L. Walling. In 1925, Fairchild began independent practice in Houston. He took a brief leave from architecture to serve in the armed forces during World War II. Fairchild served two terms as president of the Houston Chapter of the American Institute of Architects. He maintained his practice for over 50 years before retiring to Pine Bluff, Arkansas, where he died in June 1985.

River Oaks

When Will C. Hogg, Mike Hogg, and Hugh Potter began the development of River Oaks in 1923, they intended to make it into a demonstration of the highest standards of modern community planning, a role model for the rest of Houston to follow. Will Hogg's ambitiousness and Hugh Potter's skillful management of River Oaks during its first thirty years made the community known nation-wide as a symbol of Houston. Encouraging home-owners to retain the most talented architects in Houston (as well as several architects of national reputation) to design new houses, they succeeded in creating a large, professionally-administered residential community that demonstrated the potential for beauty in a raw and often raucous city. During the 1920s and 1930s, River Oaks was frequently published in national news, real estate, and design media, highlighting its planning standards, its residential architecture, and its landscape design. Since the 1970s, River Oaks has also been the focus of scholarly analysis in

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recognition of its significant contributions to the history of Houston and twentieth-century American elite suburban community development.

The creation of this type of subdivision was unique for Houston in many respects. The subdivision was laid out at, what was then, the far western edge of Houston. Prior to 1923, the majority of Houston's residential developments had occurred in a tight girdle around the downtown business district. As the sheer size of Houston increased, the demand for more neighborhoods grew along with it. Beginning in the early 20th century, the development followed a generally westerly and southwesterly expansion. The newer, more fashionable neighborhoods, such as Westmoreland (1902), Avondale (1907), Montrose (1911), Audubon Place (1906), Cherryhurst (1908), Binz and Southmore (1914), and Courtland Place (1906), developed along the Main Street corridor and to the southwest of downtown. River Oaks, however, was situated at the western city limits far away from other developments.

In addition, the developers broke with convention by laying out an organic pattern of roadways which lent a sense of spaciousness to the neighborhood, which was very different from the traditional Houston neighborhoods that followed a more rigid approach to development. These traditional neighborhoods used street grids which carved the land into predictable square or rectangular blocks. According to the *Handbook of Texas*:

"River Oaks is by Buffalo Bayou and Memorial Park in west central Houston. The residential garden suburb, which comprises 1,100 acres, was developed in the 1920s by Michael Hogg and attorney Hugh Potter, who in 1923 obtained an option to purchase 200 acres surrounding the River Oaks Country Club. In 1924 Hogg organized Country Club Estates to promote the development. The two developers retained Kansas City landscape architects Hare and Hare to provide a master plan that would protect the environmental integrity and natural beauty of the area. They also hired J. C. Nichols, who built one of the first major shopping centers in the United States, to serve as a design consultant. The master plan included homesites, a fifteen-acre campus for River Oaks Elementary School, two shopping centers, and esplanades planted with flowers. It called for underground utility lines, eliminated alleys, allowed only three intersecting streets, provided rigid building codes, and eventually banned all commercial traffic. Deed restrictions and centralized community control assured exclusivity; approval of house designs by a panel of architects and citizens and a purchase price of at least \$7,000 were required. A "gentleman's agreement" excluded blacks, Jews, and other minorities. The first home in the area, built by Will and Sue Clayton, is now listed in the National Register of Historic Places. Among the other notable houses is Ima Hogg's family home Bayou Bend [City of Houston Landmark], designed by John F. Staub and Birdsall P. Briscoe. In the late 1920s the development lost money, but by the late 1930s developers had invested \$3 million in the project, and the community had begun to influence development patterns downtown. In the 1990s River Oaks was at the geographic center of Houston. The community operated independently for three years, after which it was annexed by the city of Houston."

The creation and implementation of the River Oaks plan went far beyond the layout of the neighborhood itself. The developers also needed to devise a clever way of drawing prospective buyers away from the more traditional neighborhoods located closer to the downtown business district. This was achieved in two ways. The first was to insure that proper roads connected River Oaks with downtown Houston. The second was to bring the amenities to the residents.

Beginning in 1925, work began in earnest on Buffalo Bayou Drive, which would later become Allen Parkway. Buffalo Bayou Drive was designed by the Kansas City architectural landscape firm of Hare and Hare. The thoroughfare, atypical for its time, was built to provide a reliable route by which River

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Oaks residents could get to their jobs in downtown Houston while simultaneously providing a pleasant driving experience. The street was designed to follow the meanders of nearby Buffalo Bayou and originated at the north entry to the River Oaks neighborhood. The entry was marked by grand entry gates designed by Houston architect John F. Staub in 1926.

The plan for the scenic drive began more than a decade before its implementation with the Arthur Comey Plan for Houston in 1912. The Comey Plan was a progressive and ambitious plan to guide the future of Houston's development, with quality of life issues as a major component. Parts of the Comey plan called for the creation of scenic drives, considerable park space, and linear parks along the city's bayous. Ultimately, only a small proportion of the components of Comey's plan came to fruition. Among these realized elements were the layout of South Main at Hermann Park with its prominent traffic circles, and Allen Parkway Drive with its adjacent linear park space situated between the drive and Buffalo Bayou.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND RESTORATION HISTORY

The William Fairchild House at 2911 Ella Lee Lane was designed in 1936 by Cameron Fairchild. Its most prominent Colonial Revival details include symmetrically balanced windows with double-hung sashes and an accentuated front door. The house is of wood frame construction with brick veneer and cementitious siding, a recent alteration.

The house features a cross-gabled, normally sloped roof with slight eave overhang with boxed eaves. The cornice is emphasized with dentils. The front elevation is asymmetrical resulting from a cross-gable that projects outward, creating a T-shaped ground plan. The front entrance is located on the east elevation of the forward projecting cross-gable. The front door is glass paneled and is flanked by pilasters. The front door is capped by an entablature adorned with dentils in frieze. The entablature is supported by single-story, square pilasters. There are gabled dormers above and opposite the front entrance. The front elevation features rectangular, double hung, wood sash windows with 6/6 glass lights. The windows are flanked by hinged shutters and are accentuated by a short entablature displaying dentils in frieze. A brick chimney is prominently featured on the front eave wall

In 2006, the current owners undertook a major restoration and expansion of the home. The work included replacing the windows, siding, and insulation, and updating the plumbing, ductwork, HVAC, and wiring. The carriage house at the rear of the property was replaced with an appropriate reproduction. A master bedroom suite, sitting room and bathroom were added to the rear of the house. A sympathetic addition was installed on the east elevation which comprises a family/TV room, laundry room, and outdoor kitchen area. This addition is set back from the façade and is marginally visible from the public right-of-way. The façade of the home did not change during the restoration.

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

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

HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY

The Shaw House is one of the best remaining examples of the original architectural development of the Fairgrounds Addition neighborhood, and represents an important chapter in the story of how housing developed in Houston. The Fairgrounds Addition was named for the short-lived state fair grounds in Houston, which covered 93 acres southwest of downtown in the 1870s. In the late 1880s, single family houses were the prevalent type of dwelling in Houston, and the area was platted and sold as lots for single-family frame dwellings, mostly of Victorian design. By the 1920s, many of these original houses had been demolished to make room for Houston's first apartment buildings.

The Queen Anne-style house at 2912 Helena was built by Abraham Shaw for his family circa 1905. Descendants of the family were to retain ownership of the house until the 1980s. Now largely surrounded by vacant land and new construction, the Shaw House is a rare survivor of the neighborhood's earliest period of development. The Shaw House meets Criteria 1, 4, and 5 for Landmark designation.

HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE

The Shaw Family

The original owners of the Shaw House were a modest, working-class family. Abraham L. Shaw was born in November 1865 in Michigan. Over his lifetime he held a variety of occupations including traveling salesman, bookkeeper at a shoe company, oil company employee, and real estate agent. His wife, Effie Virginia Shaw was born Effie Smith in St. Louis, Missouri, on March 8, 1873. She worked as a housewife for most of her life. She died in Houston at Brannon's Nursing Home (2405 Riverside) on August 27, 1962, of "terminal pneumonia," a complication of chronic hepatitis. She was

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buried on August 29, 1962, at South Park Cemetery, Houston. Abraham and Effie moved to Houston between 1899 and 1900 and resided in downtown Houston on Louisiana Street for a few years. Abraham and Effie had two daughters, Rachel Gladys and Fannie Marie. Rachel Gladys was born in September 1899 in Missouri and Fannie Marie was born in approximately 1908 in Texas. The Shaw family moved into the house at 2912 Helena Street in 1905. Abraham built the house next door, 2912-A Helena Street, in 1920 and gave it to Marie as a wedding gift. Marie Shaw Crider lived in the house at 2912-A Helena Street until her death in 1999. The Shaw family owned the house at 2912 Helena Street until 1984.

Fairgrounds Addition⁸

Fairgrounds Addition was platted in 1889 and was Houston's earliest suburban neighborhood. It was located in a part of Houston called the South End, because it was situated just south of Downtown. At the time of its development, the area was prairie where cattle roamed and farms flourished. In 1873, a street car line laid its track to the entrance of the grounds at McGowen and Travis. From the early to mid-1870s, this area of Houston was the location of the important, but short-lived, 93-acre Fair Grounds, which is where the old state fairgrounds was relocated, in 1872, from its original site at the Macatee Wagon Yard near the Southern Pacific Depot, located at the present day Sesquicentennial Park in downtown Houston. Although the Fair Grounds went bankrupt in the mid-1870s, it was not until the late 1880s that the Fair Grounds Addition was created, platted, and sold by the Galveston and Houston Investment Company as lots for single-family frame dwellings, mostly of Victorian design.

Bettie Bryan is referred to as the "mother" of the Fairgrounds Addition. Bryan was the founder of the L. Bryan & Company real estate company. The growth and prosperity of Houston was due largely to its pioneer real estate companies and one such company was L. Bryan & Company. In addition to the Fairgrounds Addition, Bryan was responsible for many other additions to Houston, which were developed largely by her efforts. L. Bryan & Company's activity extended to the development of the agricultural lands to Houston and in other parts of Texas. The firm was composed of Bettie Bryan, her son Louis Bryan, and F. P. Eastburn, all of whom were well known in business, social, financial and fraternal circles of the city. Bettie and Louis Bryan were members of an old pioneer family of the same name, which is inseparably connected with the early history of Texas.

The Fairground Third Addition, the location of the Shaw House, was subdivided by Stella G. Carr and husband J.O. Carr on November 24, 1900. It is 4.71 acres of land out of Lot 28 and 31 of the Obedience Smith Survey. ¹⁰ Stella was an "active member" of the Houston Philharmonic.

Until the end of the 19th century, Houstonians lived primarily in large, single-family houses on sizeable lots. Land was so plentiful and inexpensive in Houston that dwellings with common walls, which were common in other cities, did not occur here until after the turn of the century. At the turn of the century, Houston was growing at an unprecedented rate. The devastation of Galveston by the hurricane of 1900, and the discovery of oil at Spindletop near Beaumont, four months later, ensured Houston's future as a

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major trading and business center. Because of the escalating prices of urban real estate, Houston builders began to construct higher density housing. It is believed that in 1899 Houston's first apartment building was completed, and by 1910 the city had nineteen such buildings.

By the 1920s, this new higher density housing was introduced into the South End. These low-rise "second generation" brick apartments began to replace many of the "first generation" wood-frame, single-family houses built earlier in the South End. This type of multi-family dwelling, or apartment building, also was constructed to a lesser degree on undeveloped lots and as "in-fill" in the adjacent neighborhoods of Montrose and Westmoreland.

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND RESTORATION HISTORY

The Shaw House was constructed in 1905 by the original owner, Abraham L. Shaw. The house is a one-story, asymmetrical, wood frame home which retains a high level of architectural integrity. The wood frame house rests on a pier and beam foundation and is clad with shiplap siding. The house was designed in the Queen Anne cottage style and features a partial-width porch. The porch supports are full height, classical columns and the railing is composed of simple wood. The house retains the original seven foot, double hung wood sash windows with 2/2 glass lites. The windows are flanked by louvered-style shutters. The house features a steeply pitched, combination hipped and gable roof with a prominent forward facing intersecting gable. The intersecting gable features a cut glass insert and is enclosed by a pent roof. The entire roof is clad with plain shingles. The front gable features brackets and retains some of the original cedar shingles on its facade. The roof structure was once punctuated by two slope chimneys which have been lost over time. The front entrance features a paneled, solid wood door, inset with cut glass, and topped with a glass transom.

The house was restored over many years. The previous owners removed the rotted cedar shingles which covered the entire house and replaced it with shiplap siding. They retained the original clapboard when they added the front porch. The front porch was recreated using old photos as reference. The siding and front porch were repaired and restored in 2009 by the current owners.

The Queen Anne style was the dominant style of housing in the United States from 1880 through 1900. The style was spread throughout the country by pattern books and the first architectural magazine, *The American Architect and Building News*. The style was most popular in the southern and western parts of the country, with California and the South having the most elaborate examples. The Queen Anne had an asymmetrical floor plan; steeply pitched roof of irregular shape, usually with a dominant front-facing gable; textured shingles, siding, or other device to avoid a smooth-walled appearance; and a partial or full-width porch, usually one story high. The Queen Anne cottage is a one-story house that has restrained Queen Anne massing and details.¹¹



Chapter 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 1-2 Rules of construction and definitions.

(a) In the construction of this Code, and of all ordinances, the following rules shall be observed and the following definitions shall apply, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

Parking official means the director of the general services department of administration and regulatory affairs or such other person as the said director may designate to act as the parking management official of the city and the said official's designee.

Chapter 2 ADMINISTRATION

ARTICLE XIII. GENERAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

Sec. 2-434. Functions.

The department shall:

- (1) Be responsible for construction and remodeling of city buildings, including management and provision of in-house and contract services for design of projects, construction bidding, construction contract management, construction-related testing services and construction-related environmental services;
- (2) Perform facilities management services including review of requirements for space in city buildings, negotiations of city building space leases, whether the city is the lessor or the lessee, assignment of space in city buildings, development of office size and furnishing standards, management of furnishings installations and office moves and related services whether performed directly by the department or by contractors;
- (3) Acquire real property and dispose of surplus real property in coordination with the department of public works and engineering;
- (4) Manage and oversee energy programs for city buildings;

- (5) Manage the purchasing of natural gas, electricity, heated and chilled water and related utilities for use by the city;
- (6) Provide on-site building maintenance and operations services for buildings assigned to the department for that purpose, including janitorial, cleaning, building systems maintenance, minor repairs, carpentry and construction work and security operation and maintenance;
- (7) Direct, control, and manage all on-street parking in residential and commercial areas, as more particularly described in chapter 26 of this Code;
- (8) Manage and oversee the procurement, delivery, and distribution of fuel; and
 - (9-8) Render assistance to other city departments upon request for buildings that may not be under the direct management of the department on issues relating to building management.

The foregoing duties and functions shall not extend to aviation department properties, unless so requested by the aviation department.

Sec. 2-437. Transfer of duties.

To the extent that any other reference in this Code or in any other ordinance of the city or any reference in any city contract or other document devolves duties upon the convention and entertainment facilities department, the finance and administration department or the public works and engineering department or the directors or employees of those departments that have been reassigned to the general services department or director thereof, then the reference shall be construed to mean the general services department or the director and employees thereof, as applicable.

{This provisions of this Section are being moved to Article XVI.} Sec. 2-438. Management of municipal courts parking lot.

The department shall have and exercise management of the municipal courts parking lot, being that parking lot bounded by Lubbock, Reisner, West Capitol, and Houston Avenue. The department shall collect and account for the revenues therefrom.

Users of the municipal courts parking lot shall be liable for payment of the following fees, per vehicle:

(1) Monday through Saturday, from 6:30 a.m. to 10:30 p.m., or any fraction thereof: \$3.00, which includes any applicable sales tax, for the first hour or any fraction thereof, and \$1.00, which includes any applicable sales tax, for each additional hour or fraction thereof with a maximum fee of \$10.00, which

includes any applicable sales tax; the maximum fee shall also be imposed for users who lose their time-in ticket.

- (2) Special events parking for all day Saturday, Sunday or designated city holiday, or any fraction thereof: \$2.50, which includes any applicable sales tax, per day.
- (3) Municipal courts employees working evening or night time shifts: \$0.50, which includes any applicable sales tax, per work shift.

ARTICLE XVI. DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION AND REGULATORY AFFAIRS

Secs. 2-504. Duties.

The department of administration and regulatory affairs and such employees of the department section as are assigned to it shall be charged with the following duties:

- (1) Oversight and administration of the city's central payroll function.
- (2) Oversight and administration of the city's records management.
- (3) Administration of ordinances related to regulatory services, including utilities, vehicles for hire, certain permits for alcohol-related businesses, franchise fees, and other licenses and permits.
- (4) Development, implementation, and management of citywide policies and procedures for the strategic purchasing of goods and services.
- (5) Performance of the central administrative, budgeting, and personnel duties of the office of city council.
- (6) Oversight and administration of the city's strategic alliance management functions.
- (7) Supervision and administration of the city's requirements for insurance by establishing a risk management program, and supervision and administration of fidelity bonds and notary public commissions.
- (8) Supervision of the establishment and implementation of a system of administrative procedures to improve city operations.

- (9) Supervision and administration of the duties and responsibilities of the city as provided by this Code or other ordinance, the City Charter and state law in relation to its regulation of public utilities.
- (10) In the event of an application by a utility for a change in rates, development of a recommendation and sponsorship of the city's case in the ensuing hearing.
- (11) Responsibility for all actions necessary to ensure the delivery of services required of public utilities and charging of fair and reasonable rates for such services.
- (12) Responsibility for provision of office services and reproduction management, including, but not limited to:
 - a. Pick-up and delivery of mail for all city departments.
 - b. Provision of printing and graphics services to city departments.
 - Coordination of acquisition and leasing of all types of reproduction equipment.
- (13) Responsibility for the development and implementation of citywide policies, regulations, procedures and standards for procurement, materials requirement planning, warehousing and distribution, except that procurements relating to the construction, maintenance, furnishing and management of city buildings other than on aviation department property shall be coordinated with the general services department.
- (14) Management of surplus city personal property and maintenance of a perpetual inventory thereof.
- (15) Supervision, administration, and enforcement of the franchises granted by the city.
- (16) <u>Direct, control, and manage all on-street parking in residential and commercial areas, as more particularly described in chapter 26 of this Code.</u>

Sec. 2-506. Authority of director to function in other capacities.

(a) Whenever any provision of this Code or any other city ordinance provides for the taking of any action or the performance of any function by the director of the public service department, the public service director, the director of the purchasing department, or the purchasing agent, then the director of the department of administration and

regulatory affairs shall be authorized to take such action or perform such function, or to cause the same to be taken or performed.

(b) To the extent that this Code or any other ordinance or any motion, resolution, or other document devolves duties relating to the enforcement of parking regulations in the city upon the municipal courts administration department, the convention and entertainment facilities department, the public works and engineering department, the general services department, or the directors or employees of those departments, then such references shall be construed to mean the department of administration and regulatory affairs or the director or employees thereof.

Sec. 26-2. Definitions.

Sec. 26-42. Composition.

- (a) The commission shall be composed of nine regular members and eight nonvoting ex officio members. The nine regular members and a representative of the city's municipal management districts, as provided in subsection (c)(7), shall be appointed by the mayor and confirmed by the city council. The commission shall make recommendations to city council on the appropriate number of its members.
- (b) At least seven of the nine regular members of the commission shall be persons knowledgeable of parking issues affecting commercial, institutional or residential areas in the city who possess substantial experience in one or more of the following areas: retail; job creation and retainage; residential parking; sports and entertainment; recreational opportunities; nonprofit institutional activity; air travel; hospitality; and commercial off-street parking operations.
 - (c) The ex officio members shall be:
 - (1) The director of the general services department of administration and regulatory affairs or his designee, who shall also serve as secretary to the commission.
 - (2) The director of the public works and engineering department or his designee.
 - (3) The director of the convention and entertainment facilities department or his designee.
 - (4) A designee of the Metropolitan Transit Authority of Harris County, Texas.
 - (5) The director of the planning and development department or his designee.

- (6) A designee of the Harris County Commissioners Court.
- (7) A person representing the city's municipal management districts.
- (8) A person designated by the Houston Commission on Disabilities.
- (d) Eight of the regular members of the commission shall be residents of the city. The remaining membership position need not be occupied by a resident of the city, provided the proposed member works full time or owns a business within the city.

These CIP levels were: Minimum Health, Safety & Regulatory (HSR); Minimum HSR Plus Selective Investments; and Best Practices to provide for the long term health and sustainability of the system.				
The Rate Study results were presented to the Budget and Fiscal Affairs Committee on April 6, 2010, with a recommendation to set rates to support the Best Practices CIP and to use the Producer Price Index for annual automatic adjustments, to the degree allowable under the provisions of Proposition One. The Committee voted to move this recommendation forward for Council consideration but expressed some concern relative to the level of increase for the multi-family customer class. After further review, the administration recommends adopting the Best Practices rates proposed to the committee with the exception of Multi-Family Residential and Commercial customers. Those rates would be set to equal 100% of cost of service. It is estimated that these rates would result in an increase equivalent to \$7.73 per month for the average apartment unit. The reduction in CUS revenue will be funded by decreasing the amount of "pay-as-you-go" projects in the CIP, however the total capacity for capital improvements will remain at \$370 million annually for FY11 through FY15.					
To further address the rate burden on multi-family residences, the administration is working with the Houston Apartment Association to establish a rebate program to encourage water conservation in apartment complexes that currently use much higher than average amounts of water. The planned program would provide up to \$14 million in rebates each year for two years to complexes that meet the to be determined qualifications. Discussion is also underway regarding the rate impact specifically on low income multi-family housing projects that have received Federal Income Tax Credits, and the administration will work to address this issue to the degree allowable under State law.

Amount and Source Of Funding: Revenue **Finance Budget:** SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: On July 29, 2009, Ordinance 2009-0696, City Council approved the purchase of a ground lease for 2.619 acres of land and two buildings at 2250 and 2252 Holcombe Boulevard that consist of a laboratory and office space, for the DHHS laboratories relocation project. As part of this transaction, the City also assumed a lease, as landlord, with M.D. Anderson for 11,188 square feet of space at 2250 Holcombe Blvd. M.D. Anderson has utilized this space since 2001. The assumed lease is the subject of two prior amendments. The proposed Third Amendment will clarify the building services that M.D. Anderson will provide; establish a monthly payment of \$34,037.67 which includes \$7,000.00 per month for operating expenses; offset the rental rate by the cost of operating and maintenance expenses for the building; and provide flexibility in the termination date of the lease to accommodate the City's planned renovations to the buildings. Therefore, the General Services Department recommends that City Council approve and authorize a Third Amendment to the Lease Agreement with the University of Texas System for the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center for space at 2250 Holcombe Boulevard. Forty-one prospective bidders downloaded the solicitation document from the Strategic Purchasing Division's (SPD) ebidding website and two bids were received as outlined below. SPD conducted a thorough search for additional vendors who could possibly perform these services. As a result, eight vendors were identified and were provided a notification of the Invitation to Bid (ITB). Subsequent to the receipt of the bid, vendors were contacted to determine the reason for the limited response to the ITB; potential respondents advised SPD that the required services were not in their core business or they lack the necessary equipment to meet the scope of work requirements specified in the ITB.

The Utility District Review Committee has evaluated the application with respect to wastewater collection and treatment, potable water distribution, storm water conveyance, and other public services.
