This contract, C31474A, is one of several disposal contracts with comparable rates that the Department of Solid Waste Management maintains in order to have disposal facilities available in as many sectors of the city as possible for operational efficiency and reduced vehicle expense due to shorter travel distances. This contract renews automatically each year until its completion date of July 1, 2014, and has no maximum contract amount. Continued funding relies on an annual supplemental allocation of budgeted funds approved by City Council. Funding in the amount of \$2,000,000.00 is requested at this time.

This contract stems from four contracts with Waste Management, Inc. approved by Council in 1988 for disposal of non-putrescible solid waste at their Hardy Road, Tanner Road, Indian Paint Brush, Green Shadow and Fairbanks landfills. In 1991 Council approved an ordinance that merged the separate contracts into a single contract, and in 1999 Council approved a second amendment that adjusted the contract term, disposal rates and contractor's responsibilities. This contract is also utilized to dispose of both putrescible and nonputrescible waste at Waste Management, Inc.'s Atascocita landfill. Throughout the contract history, Council has approved supplemental allocations on an annual basis. With this proposed funding the contract total to date will be \$14,442,500.







SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Director of the Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department (ARA) recommends that City Council approve an Ordinance amending Chapter 46 of the Houston Code of Ordinances ("Chapter 46") relating to School Vehicles.

ARA regulates private school vehicles pursuant to Chapter 46 of the Code of Ordinances. These are not traditional school buses. Instead these are small vans, typically accommodating only up to 15 passengers. Private school vehicle operators generally provide service to those who live within a two-mile radius of schools not serviced by school district buses. In the majority of cases, these private school vehicle operators provide a very valuable service to low-income households, filling a transportation gap that allows the children in these households to attend school regularly, at a very moderate cost of \$10 to \$20 per week per child. There are currently 119 active school bus vehicle permittees operating 183 vehicles within the Houston city limits.

On December 15, 2010, City Council approved Ordinance 2010-1016, authorizing cost of service fee increases to the majority of permits and licenses issued by the City of Houston, including school bus vehicle licenses.

Section 46-289 establishes the annual school vehicle license fee, which currently may be paid in two equal partial installments on September 1 and February 1 of the permit year. Until the December 2010 omnibus fee increases, school vehicle license fees had remained unchanged since 1995. Ordinance 2010-1016 authorized the school vehicle fee to be increased from \$70 to \$200. An administrative fee of \$25 per transaction was also authorized. As a result of the fee increase, Council offices and ARA have received dozens of phone calls and emails from school vehicle companies expressing their displeasure with the higher fees.

On August 15, 2011, at the request of several Council Members, ARA representatives met with a group of 11 school bus operators representing the Texas Association of Private Bus Owners. The bus operators explained that the dramatic fee increase presents a hardship to operators overall, and particularly at this time of year, when repairs and maintenance expenses are highest as the school year is about to begin and the vehicles are prepared to be put back into service. At that time ARA explained that the fee increase was driven by cost of service, so the fee itself could not be reduced. However, there are options to mitigate the impact on individual operators:

- 1) Operators may pay the fees in two equal installments to lessen the cash outlay.

Director of ARA for a refund of any portion of his total fees paid for the previous license year that exceeds 2% of the licensee's gross receipts from the operation of all licensed school vehicles.

3) As the hardship appears to be primarily a cash flow issue, with Council approval the licensing period could be changed to November 1 to October 31 to move the cash outlay to late October instead of August.

The industry members present at the meeting agreed unanimously that changing the licensing period, and hence the payment due date for the license fees, would substantially relieve some of financial pressure being experienced by the school bus operators.

Recommendation:

Based on the foregoing, the Administration & Regulatory Affairs Department respectfully requests City Council's approval of the recommended revisions to Chapter 46 of the Code of Ordinances.

Sec. 46-289. Annual license fee.

- (a) There is hereby assessed an annual fee which shall be payable by each licensee on or before NovemberSeptember 1 of each year, provided that the director shall alternatively allow the fee to be paid in installments, with one half due by NovemberSeptember 1 and the balance by the following February 1.
- (b) The amount of the fee shall be equal to \$200.00 for each licensed school vehicle having a capacity of 15 or fewer passengers, \$90.00 for each licensed school vehicle having a capacity of at least 16 but not more than 59 passengers, and \$115.00 for each school vehicle having a greater capacity. Each of the foregoing capacities shall be computed as including the driver. There shall be no fee for replacement of a vehicle with another vehicle of equivalent capacity. In the event that a license is issued after March 1, or in the event that an additional vehicle is placed into service after March 1, then an amount equal to one-half of the foregoing fees shall be payable for the balance of the annual fee period.
- (c) In the event that any licensee fails to pay the fee or any installment before the applicable due date, his license shall be suspended, and no school vehicle may be operated under the license. If the fee or installment is not paid by the thirtieth day following the due date, the license shall terminate and not thereafter be subject to renewal, provided that the former license holder may apply for a new license in the manner specified in this article.
- (d) The fee imposed under this section is based upon an estimate of the fee allowed pursuant to section 502.003 of the Texas Transportation Codeby Texas Revised Civil Statutes article 6698 in the amount of two percent of gross receipts. Any licensee who wishes to do so may keep a record of gross receipts in the manner prescribed by regulation of the director. Within 90 days following the expiration of any license year (NovemberSeptember 1 to October 31 of the following year August 31) a licensee who has kept a record of gross receipts in the prescribed form may apply to the director for a refund of any portion of his total fees paid under this section for the previous license year that exceeds two percent of the licensee's gross receipts from the operation of all licensed school vehicles. The refund application shall be made on a form promulgated by the director. The application shall state the amount of refund requested and shall be accompanied by copies of records maintained by the licensee in the form approved by the director. The application as well as any supplementary material required by the director must be accompanied by an affidavit signed and sworn to by or on behalf of the licensee. The licensee shall state that the application (or supplement) and all attachments thereto are correct and complete and do not omit any material item, and that the licensee either: (i) has personal knowledge of each matter affirmed, or (ii) has conducted a thorough investigation into each matter affirmed. Upon receipt of a complete and timely application, together with any required supplements, and after examining and investigating same, the

director shall either:

- (1) Refund or credit to the account of the licensee the amount by which the total fees paid for the previous calendar year exceed two percent of the licensee's total gross receipts for the previous calendar year; or
- (2) Deny the refund. If the refund is denied, the director shall give written notice of the reason and, upon request, shall afford the licensee an informal hearing on the matter before a disinterested hearing official.
- (e) The fees provided in this section are also made expressly applicable to school bus licenses issued by ordinance and shall apply in lieu of any other fees that may be stated in the license ordinance.

Sec. 46-290. Vehicle inspection.

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person holding a school vehicle license issued under this article or a school bus license issued by ordinance to drive or cause to be driven any school vehicle while in service for the transportation of any student, unless the vehicle has been inspected as required in this section or inspected and permitted by the Texas Department of Transportation.
- (b) Each vehicle shall be inspected before it is initially placed into service and thereafter during OctoberAugust of each year by the director at such location as the director may specify. The director shall approve the vehicle if he determines that:
 - (1) The vehicle has current Texas registration and required Texas vehicle inspection stickers for both safety and air quality, if applicable;
 - (2) That the vehicle is marked as provided in section 46-301 of this Code:
 - (3) The vehicle is in generally sound working condition with no apparent safety-related defects and has a functioning speedometer and odometer;
 - (4) The vehicle has a lap or lap/shoulder seat belt for the driver and for each passenger seating space to the extent required by state law; and

- (5) The vehicle has no seats that have been added in excess of the manufacturer's specifications.
- (c) Upon the satisfactory completion of the inspection, the director shall issue and permanently affix a certification decal to the windshield of the vehicle. In any prosecution under this section, it shall be presumed that a vehicle has not been inspected as required in this section unless it has a current and valid certification decal affixed.
- (d) Replacement certification decals shall only be provided upon reinspection of the vehicle.

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





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Introduction

The purpose of the Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan (the collectively the Parts A, B, C, and D Plans are the "Plans") for Reinvestment Zone Number Ten, City of Houston, Texas (herein referred to as the "TIRZ") is to set forth goals, expectations, redevelopment plans and programs needed to facilitate planned residential and commercial developments and in a manner consistent with the Kingwood Annexation Service Plan, included as an Exhibit to Ordinance 96-1115, adopted by City Council on October 23, 1996 and which annexed the area into the City of Houston. The intent of the Plans is to ensure that the improvements will result in the long-term stability and viability of the TIRZ area.

The City created the TIRZ by Ordinance No. 1997-1589, adopted by City Council on December 17, 1997, within an area covering approximately 1,426 acres, and located primarily in the vicinity of Lake Houston, and also known as Kingwood. The City adopted a Plan for the area on April 21, 1999 by Ordinance No. 1999-0387 (the "Part A Plan"). On September 11, 1999, by Ordinance 1999-0825, City Council approved an Amended Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for the TIRZ (the "Part B Plan"). Subsequently, after recommendation by the TIRZ, City Council, by Ordinance 1999-0853, approved the annexation of approximately 508 additional acres into the TIRZ. The enlarged TIRZ included areas for which several property owners requested annexation including the Kingwood Lakes South, North Tract, Woodstream Forest and Riverchase Village Subdivisions; in addition several public rights-of-ways were also included in the annexed area including Mills Branch Drive, North Park Drive, Kingwood Drive and Woodland Hills Drive. The expansion area resulted in a total Zone area of approximately 1,934 acres. On April 23, 2008, by Ordinance 2008-0337, City Council adopted an Amended Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for the Zone (the "Part C Plan").

The TIRZ and the City now desire to further amend the TIRZ Project Plan and Financing Plan as further described herein (the "Part D Plan").

Section One:

The Part A Plan: The Part A Plan covered a total of approximately 1,426 acres. The primary focus of the Part A Plan was to facilitate the design and construction of water, wastewater, and drainage facilities in order to facilitate the development of new residential and commercial properties. The area included within the boundaries of the Part A Plan included open land where such infrastructure was absent and where residential and commercial development would not occur but for the creation of the TIRZ.

The Part B Plan: The Part B Plan sought to build upon the goals previously defined in the Part A Plan and expanded the TIRZ boundaries by 508 acres. The Part B Plan further defined TIRZ functions specific to assisting in the development of undeveloped property within the TIRZ and included provisions for street reconstruction and utility system upgrades on North Park Drive from Lake Houston Parkway to Mills Branch Drive, Kingwood Drive from Willow Terrace to Mills Branch Drive; and Woodland Hills Drive south from Kingwood Drive to Hamblin Road. The Part B Plan also provided for the participation of Humble Independent School District in the TIRZ.

The Part C Plan: The Part C Plan both restated and further defined the fundamental goals and objectives identified in the Part A and Part B Plans. The Part C Plan also included provisions for the funding of a new project cost category, Cultural and Public Facilities Improvements. The new category allowed for the construction of a new larger library and the conversion of the existing library into a community center, both of which were located outside the boundaries of the TIRZ. By Ordinance 2008-037, City Council found that the library and community center, which contained multiple public meeting rooms, was an area of public assembly for the purposes of (Texas Tax Code §311.010(b)) and that the library and community center would benefit the property within the TIRZ.

Section Two:

The Part D Plan: The Part D Plan includes provisions for the 975.4 acres of the newly annexed Kingwood West area and its adjacent public rights-of-ways. Together the Parts A, B, C and D Plans will create a viable and attractive environment for new investment and redevelopment. Improvements have been identified that will enhance the community by attracting new businesses and residents to the area. The proposed Part D Plan projects include upgrades and improvements to public utility systems, public roadways and thoroughfares, and public safety facility improvements. Annexation of the Kingwood West area will provide funding for the project costs identified in Exhibit 1, Part D Plan.

Proposed Goals for Improvements in the Zone:

Public improvements proposed in the Part D Plan are in relationship to the original goals of the Zone and are as follows:

Goal 1: The creation of pedestrian-friendly, safe environments through upgrades and improvements to streets and sidewalks, with ample lighting and streetscape amenities. Streetscape enhancements are required to create an environment that will help stimulate investment in retail, residential, and commercial developments. Enhanced streetscapes components will include: sidewalks, lighting, signage, street trees, landscaping, benches and other pedestrian amenities. The reconstruction of key streets and major thoroughfares will enhance the level of service in the area. The construction of sidewalk systems including ADA complaint ramps and other treatments will improve pedestrian safety, enhance the visual environment and provide connectivity both within the community and to adjacent districts. All improvements will be integrated with the street reconstruction programs of the City of Houston, TxDOT, and other public entities. Attention will be placed on the leveraging of TIRZ monies through the funding of elements not addressed by the CIP Programs of sister agencies.

Goal 2: Cultural and Public Facilities

Increasing public and cultural facilities for the Kingwood community has emerged as an important public policy goal since the date of the Part C Plan amendment. Providing improved infrastructure, more fire, police, library, and cultural/community centers will lead to improved security and enhance the quality of life for existing and new residents and businesses.

Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for the Zone.

A. Project Plan

Existing Uses of Land (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(1)): Map 1 attached hereto depicts the existing land and proposed uses in the Original and Annexed Areas of the Zone. The existing and proposed land uses include single-family residential, multi-family residential, commercial, office, industrial, public and institutional, transportation and utility, park and open spaces, undeveloped and agricultural production land uses.

Proposed Changes of Zoning Ordinances, Master Plan of Municipality, Building Codes, and other Municipal Ordinances (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(2)): All construction will be performed in conformance with the City's existing rules and regulations. There are no proposed changes to any City ordinance, master plan, or building code.

Estimated Non-Project Costs (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(3)) The non-project costs reflect in part costs

that the City of Houston will fund towards infrastructure improvements within the greater Kingwood area as part of its ongoing Capital Improvement Program.

Method of Relocating Persons to be Displaced, if any, as a Result of Implementing the Plan (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(4)): It is not anticipated that any residents will be displaced by any of the projects to be undertaken in the Zone.

B. Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan

Estimated Project Costs (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(1)): Exhibit 1 (attached) details the proposed public improvement and administrative project costs. The dollar amounts are approximate and may be amended from time to time by City Council. The financing costs are a function of project financing needs and will vary with market conditions from the estimates shown on Exhibit 1.

Proposed Kind, Number, and Location of all Proposed Public Works or Public Improvements to be Financed in the Zone (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(2)): These details are described throughout the Plan.

Economic Feasibility (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(3)): An economic feasibility study was completed for the Kingwood area in 1999. The study documents the economic potential in the Zone. Exhibits 2 through 4 constitute incremental revenue estimates for the Zone. The incremental revenue estimates are projected to be sufficient to cover the costs of the proposed redevelopment and infrastructure improvements in the Zone. The Plan estimates total project costs of \$152,390,490. The Zone and the City find and determine that the Part A Plan, Part B Plan, Part C Plan and Part D Plan are economically feasible.

Estimated Amount of Bond Indebtedness; Estimated Time When Related Costs or Monetary Obligations Incurred (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(4), §311.011(c)(5)): Issuance of notes and bonds by the Zone will occur as tax increment revenues allow. The value and timing of the issuance of notes or bonds will correlate to debt capacity as derived from the attached revenue and project schedules, as well as actual market conditions for the issue and sale of such notes and bonds.

Methods and Sources of Financing Project Costs and Percentage of Increment from Taxing Units Anticipated to Contribute Tax Increment to the Zone (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(6)): Methods and sources of financing include the issuance of notes and bonds, as well as collaboration with developers and other entities for grant funding and partnerships. TY 1999 was the base year for the Zone, and TY 2027 is the scheduled termination date. As outlined in Exhibits 2 through 4, at least \$92.1 million of increment is estimated to be generated by the Zone for use in funding project costs. This figure is calculated using an estimated collection rate of 95% and a City contribution of \$0.63875/\$100 of assessed valuation, and a Humble Independent School District contribution of \$1.5200/\$100 of assessed valuation.

<u>Current Total Appraised Value of Taxable Real Property</u> (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(7)): The current projected appraised value of taxable real property in the Zone, as of April 12, 2011 is \$468,096,073.

Estimated Captured Appraised Value of Zone During Each Year of Existence (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(8)): The estimated captured appraised value for the remaining duration of the Zone is set forth in Exhibit 2.

Zone Duration (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(9)): When initially created by City Council on December 17, 1997, the term of the Zone was established at 30 years.





SPECIFIC EXPLANATION: On December 29, 2009, City Council approved an architectural services contract with Jackson & Ryan Architects, Inc. to perform design and construction phase services for a second kennel building adjacent to the existing South kennel building. The second kennel building was planned to reduce overcrowding, improve operational efficiencies and provide limited adoption activities. However, the City later opted to construct a new Animal Adoption Center on recently acquired City property adjacent to the BARC facilities that will include one kennel building with future expansion capabilities. The new site configuration enables the City to effectively segregate the retail aspects of BARC from the regulatory and public safety realities of the shelter. Currently adopters and fosters are required to share the same physical space with individuals who are turning in sick animals, kitten litters and puppies, or animals that may have behavioral issues.

Under the new scope of work in the Restated and Amended contract Jackson & Ryan will provide a master plan for the new site, which includes first floor renovation of the North Kennel building (Dome), and design and construction phase services for the new adoption center campus in five phases. Phase 1 includes an adoption lobby, kennels for 82 adoption dogs, detention pond (water feature), dog parks, 20 parking spaces and landscaping, and renovation of the Dome. Phase 2 includes kennels for an additional 82 adoption dogs. Phase 3 includes a facility for 97 adoption cats. Phase 4 will construct a veterinarian clinic, and possibly an administration and training centerin Phase 5.

Therefore, the General Services Department recommends that City Council approve a restated and amended architectural services contract with Jackson & Ryan Architects, Inc. to perform design and construction phase services for a new animal adoption center and renovation to the existing Dome, and appropriate \$497,766.91 for Phase 1. It is further recommended that Council appropriate an additional \$15,000.00 for pre-construction phase services under the existing contract with SpawMaxwell Company.





As you know, this project is a continuation of the previous Sims Bayou North WWTP Improvements Project (constructed under GFS No.: R-000265-0056-4) and consists of installing the following major elements:

- 1. Two remaining integral gear single stage centrifugal 800 HP blowers in the existing Blower Building and connecting piping spools.
- 2. A Center Point power company transformer to power the new blowers
- 3. 4.16 kV switchgear section in the existing Blower Building Electrical Room.

As mentioned in my previous email, a majority of the project cost comes from this equipment. All equipment provided will need to meet our technical specifications outlined in Division 11 thru Div. 16. This equipment typically comes from firms who do not fall under the category of MBE or SBE.

Labor cost associated with installation of the proposed equipment is a very minimum. In discussion with the current on-site Contractor who constructed the Blower Building it was stated that labor cost for this new project will be 2% or less. Installation of the blower equipment requires critical machine alignment and installation knowledge. The Prime Contractors usually provide their own skilled labor to perform installation of this type of equipment. He went on to indicate that they are not aware of any qualified minority electrical subcontractors in the Houston area to perform specific work of installing and connection of 4,160 Volt Switchgear and equipment. Integration of the two new blowers to the existing blower control panel and plant SCADA will require a qualified Process Control System Supplier (PCSS) and Software Engineer to complete as specified and City Wastewater Operations Group SCADA qualification requirements. Review of the detailed cost estimate will indicate that labor and miscellaneous items is a small fraction of the cost of the project.

Also for your information, on the current contract, the Contractor used MBE/SBE on paving, concrete, misc. metal, pipe fabrication and misc. piping to meet his goals. However in this project there is only a couple of pipe fittings and two small panels of metal grating that will be modified. Thus, there is nowhere near not the same level of percentage participation that can be reached.

The reason these blowers were not installed in the previous project was due to City funding limitations.



SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

A RESOLUTION REGARDING LITIGATION OF MATTERS IN DISPUTE WITH AMERICAN TRAFFIC SOLUTIONS, INC. ("ATS").

WHEREAS, On November 2, 2010, the people of Houston voted to amend the City Charter so as to prohibit the use of red light cameras to enforce state and local traffic laws ("Proposition 3"), which vote was canvassed and certified by the Houston City Council on November 15, 2010; and

WHEREAS, on November 15, 2010, the City Attorney, at the direction of the Mayor and in the exercise of the City's rights under its contract with ATS ("Contract") provided ATS with notice of termination of the Contract and instructed that the cameras be turned off; and

WHEREAS, On November 15, 2010, the City brought suit for declaratory judgment in federal court against ATS (Civil Action No. 10-cv-04545) ("ATS Suit") seeking a declaration of its rights and obligations under the Contract, as ATS disputed the City's right to terminate said Contract; and

WHEREAS, on June 17, 2011, U. S. District Judge Lynn Hughes issued an interlocutory order in the ATS Suit, ruling that the Proposition 3 election was invalid, concluding that it was an untimely effort to repeal the underlying ordinance (the "Order"); and

WHEREAS, on June 20, 2011, ATS corresponded with the City representing that if the cameras were turned back on it would seek to arrive at a mutual resolution with the City regarding the company's claim for damages under the contract, but that otherwise, its damages may be \$20 million dollars or more; and

WHEREAS, on July 6, 2011, the City sought permission to appeal Judge Hughes' Order, and the Mayor simultaneously instructed that the cameras be turned back on in order to mitigate any damages owing by the City to ATS under the Contract; and

WHEREAS, on July 8, 2011, Judge Hughes denied the City permission to appeal his Order while the ATS Suit remained pending, thereby requiring the City to obtain a final judgment on the merits before such Order could be appealed; and

WHEREAS, further court proceedings revealed that it would take months to secure such a final judgment, and the Mayor thusly instructed the City Attorney

to engage in settlement negotiations with ATS in order to bring an expeditious resolution to the ATS Suit and enable the cameras to be turned off; and

WHEREAS, settlement negotiations between the parties ensued but were unsuccessful, culminating in receipt of a formal demand dated August 8, 2011 from ATS for \$18 million dollars to settle the litigation if the cameras were to be turned off; and

WHEREAS, it was the intention of the Mayor to place such settlement demand on the August 17, 2011 City Council Agenda to enable Council to vote to accept or reject it, but with a recommendation from the Mayor that it be rejected on the grounds that it was wholly unreasonable, and that the cameras be turned off in light of same; and

WHEREAS, on August 11, 2011, ATS formally rescinded its settlement demand, apparently having become aware of the Mayor's intentions with regard to placing same on the City Council Agenda; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor now recommends that the City litigate the ATS Suit to conclusion on the merits or to reasonable settlement, and that the cameras be turned off, and remain off, in any event; and

WHEREAS, City Council believes it is appropriate to state, by resolution, its endorsement of the position of the City with regards to the litigation with ATS; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS:

Section 1. That the findings contained in the preamble of this Resolution are determined to be true and correct and are hereby adopted as part of this Resolution.

Section 2. That the City Council hereby affirms that the City litigate the ATS Suit to conclusion on the merits or to reasonable settlement (any such settlement subject to formal approval of the City Council), and that the red light cameras be turned off, and remain off, in any event, effective with the passage and approval of this Resolution.

Section 3. That following the passage and approval of this Resolution, City Council shall consider repeal of the underlying ordinance authorizing the use of red light cameras in the City of Houston.

Section 4. That this Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; however, in the event that the Mayor fails to sign this Resolution within five days after its passage and adoption, it shall take effect in accordance with Article VI, Section 6, Houston City Charter.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE CODE OF ORDINANCES, HOUSTON, TEXAS, BY REPEALING ARTICLE XIX, CHAPTER 45, PHOTOGRAPHIC TRAFFIC SIGNAL ENFORCEMENT SYSTEMS; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO THE FOREGOING SUBJECT; CONTAINING A REPEALER; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS:

Section 1. That Chapter 45 of the Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas is hereby amended by repealing Article XIX, Photographic Traffic Signal Enforcement. Systems.

Section 2. That the provisions of Article XIX of Chapter 45, which is repealed in Section 1 of this Ordinance, are saved from repeal for the limited purpose of their continuing application to any violation of said Article XIX that occurred (i) before 12:01 a.m. November 15, 2010, and (ii) during the period beginning at 12:01 a.m. July 24, 2011 and ending at 12:01 a.m. on the effective date of this Ordinance. For this purpose, a violation of Article XIX is deemed to have been committed if any element of the violation occurred during the periods defined in this Section.

Section 3. That, if any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or their application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting this Ordinance that no portion hereof or provision or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality, voidness or invalidity of any other portion hereof, and all provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable for that purpose.

Section 4. That there exists a public emergency requiring that this Ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction as requested in writing by the Mayor; therefore, this Ordinance shall be passed finally on such date and shall take effect at 12:01 a.m. on the 24th day of August, 2011.

Definition of Principal Place of

Business

As written, the proposed ordinance requires that a minimum of 20% of a company's workforce be regularly based at a place or places of business in the incorporated limits of the city or the local area, in order to be granted preferential status as a "city" or "local" business.

In order to ensure that all companies who make significant contributions to the local Houston economy, specifically by providing local jobs, have a fair chance to compete for City contracts, I propose requiring a company to have local personnel and resources that <u>will be used</u> to complete a minimum of 80% of the work required by any contract where the company makes a bid in order to qualify for preferential "city" or "local" status. This is a more inclusive, situation based method which will allow for greater participation by vendors and more efficient application of the preference by city departments.

I offer the following Amendment to alter the definition of *Principal Place of Business* within the proposed Hire Houston First Ordinance, Article XI, Chapter 15, Contracts, of the Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas, Relating to Local Contracting Preferences:

Modify Section 15-176.

Definitions.

Principal Place of Business means the business must be headquartered or have an established place or places of business in the incorporated limits of the city or local area, as applicable, wherein staff and equipment capable of completing at least 80% of the work required by any contract obtained from the City from which 20% or more of the entity's workforce are regularly based, and from which a substantial role of its operations is conducted. A location utilized solely as a post office box, mail drop or telephone message center or any combination thereof, with no substantial work function, shall not be construed as a principal place of business.

Purchases of Services

As written, the proposed ordinance contains permissive rather than mandatory language in several areas. This permissive language weakens the ordinance to the point of relegating it to the status of a mere suggestion to department directors and city purchasing agents.

In accordance with City Council's determination that in any procurement addressed by this Ordinance, local bidders offer the City the best combination of contract price and economic development opportunities, including employment of residents of the City and increased tax revenue to the City. Furthermore, in order to better achieve the stated policy of the City to place an affirmative duty on City departments to grant a preference to city and/or local businesses, it is necessary to change the permissive term <u>may</u> to the mandatory term <u>shall</u> in two sections.

I offer the following Amendment to alter the language of the proposed Hire Houston First Ordinance, Article XI, Chapter 15, Contracts, of the Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas, Relating to Local Contracting Preferences sections 15-177 and 15-178:

Modify Section 15-177. Hire Houston First Program – Purchases of Personal Property.

- (a) Contracts of \$100,000 or more. In purchasing any personal property that is not affixed to real property, if the city receives one or more bids from a bidder that is a city business and whose bid is within three percent of the lowest bid price received by the city from a bidder who is not a city business, and all other relevant criteria and legal requirements have been met, the city shall may enter into a contract with a value of \$100,000 or more with the bidder that is a city business, as defined in this article.
- (1)The lowest bidder; or
- (2) The bidder that is a city business, as defined in this article.
- (b) Contracts under \$100,000. In purchasing any personal property that is not affixed to real property, if the city receives one or more bids from a bidder that is a city business and whose bid is within five percent of the lowest bid price received by the city from a bidder who is not a city business, and all other relevant criteria and legal

(b) In procuring architectural, engineering or land surveying services under the Professional Services Procurement Act, Tex. Gov't Code, Sec. 2254.004, the contracting department will may, when appropriate consider the status of a provider as a local business as part of the qualifications determination when specific knowledge of local conditions are deemed beneficial to a project. For purposes of this subsection, "principal place of business" means the business must be headquartered or have an established place or places of business in the incorporated limits of the city or the local area, as applicable, from which they certify that they have adequates full time staff, equipment and other resources to locally perform 80% or more of the work associated with the scope of services defined within a contact. A location utilized solely as a post office box, mail drop or telephone message center or any combination thereof, with no other substantial work function, shall not be construed as a principal place of business.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

Prior to 2011, Texas law allowed municipalities with a population less than 250,000 to award contracts to businesses located within the city limits, providing the bid was within three percent of the next lowest bid. This option was not available to larger cities, including the City of Houston.

As part of its legislative agenda for the 82nd legislative session, the city advocated for and secured an amendment to Texas law that would allow for local preferences in awarding business to local vendors, and thus promote economic development in the city.

The recommended addition to the Code of Ordinances reflects the city's intent to spend locally when the local bidder offers the best combination of contract price and additional economic development opportunities, including the employment of residents of the city and increased tax revenue to the city.

In this article, there are two categories of vendors: those located in city limits ("city businesses"), and those located in the eight-county area (Harris, Fort Bend, Montgomery, Brazoria, Galveston, Chambers, Waller and Liberty)("local businesses").

Once implemented, the ordinance will require purchases under \$50,000 to be made from local businesses, if their bids are not more than five percent greater than the lowest bid. When making purchases of personal property valued at more than \$50,000 but less than \$100,000, a city business may be given preference over a non-city business if its bid is within five percent of the lowest bidder; if over \$100,000 the bid must be within three percent. When making purchases of services valued at more than \$50,000 but less than \$100,000, a local business may be given preference over a non-local business if its bid is within five percent of the lowest bidder, if over \$100,000 the bid must be within three percent. In addition, in making procurements under the Professional Services Procurement Act for architectural, engineering, or landsurveying services, the status of a provider as a local business may be considered as part of the qualifications determination.

Local preference requirements will not apply based on a determination that to do so would interfere with the City's contract needs.

The Mayor's Office of Business Opportunities (MOBO) will establish the documentation necessary to establish a principal place of business in the city or local area and shall make the final determination as to eligibility as a city or local business. MOBO shall also produce semi-annual reports summarizing the dollar amount of procurements awarded to city and local businesses under this program.

WHEREAS, City Council wishes to use the City spending powers in a manner that promotes fiscal responsibility and maximizes the effectiveness of local tax dollars by ensuring a portion of citizens' tax dollars remain in the local economy for economic benefit of the citizens; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that by encouraging the local business capacity, the City will maintain an able and competitive pool of businesses from which to choose to procure goods and services; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that awarding contracts to local vendors provides additional economic benefit for a city's citizens by keeping their tax dollars local; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds the principal place of business of a business is a relevant criterion in providing best value for the City; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that awarding contracts to businesses located in the surrounding eight-county area, defined herein as the *local area*, benefits the City and its residents by improving employment opportunities, increasing property values, and increasing sales tax revenues; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that the Local Government Code Sections 271.905 and 271.9051 allow the City to consider a vendor's principal place of business in awarding certain contracts; and

WHEREAS, City Council finds that there is no definition of "principal place of business" in the statutes of the State of Texas; therefore, the City adopts its own definition herein; and

WHEREAS, City Council determines that in any procurement addressed by this Ordinance, the local bidder offers the City the best combination of contract price and additional economic development opportunities, including the employment of residents of the City and increased tax revenue to the City;

WHEREAS, City Council finds that the conclusions and determinations contained herein meet the written determination required by the Local Government Code in Sections 271.905(b)(2) and 271.9051(b)(2) or as they may be amended or renumbered; and

WHEREAS, City Council desires to add Article XI to Chapter 15, Contracts, of the Code of Ordinances to create a requirement to utilize state law to create a contracting preference for local businesses; NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS:

- **Section 1.** That the findings contained in the preamble of this Ordinance are determined to be true and correct and are hereby adopted.
- **Section 2.** That Chapter 15 of the Code of Ordinances, Houston, Texas, is hereby amended by adding a new Article that reads as follows:

"ARTICLE XI. HIRE HOUSTON FIRST

Sec. 15-175. Declaration of policy.

- (a) It is the policy of the city to use the city's spending powers in a manner that promotes fiscal responsibility and maximizes the effectiveness of local tax dollars by ensuring a portion of citizens' tax dollars remain in the local economy for economic benefit of the citizens by utilizing all available legal opportunities to contract with city and/or local businesses.
- (b) It is the policy of the city to place an affirmative duty on city departments to grant a preference to city and/or local businesses unless doing so would be clearly contrary to the best interests of the city.
- (c) It is the policy of the city to achieve the policy goal in subsection (a) above by utilizing all permissible tools.
 - (d) Nothing in this article prohibits the city from rejecting all bids.

Sec. 15-176. Definitions.

The words and phrases defined in this section have the following meanings:

Bid means any procurement method governed by the Texas Local Government Code, Title 8 Acquisition, Sale or Lease of Property, or as it may be amended.

City business means a business with a principal place of business within the city limits.

Local area means the eight counties in and surrounding Houston city limits. The counties are Harris, Fort Bend, Montgomery, Brazoria, Galveston, Chambers, Waller and Liberty.

Local business means a business with a principal place of business in the local area.

Principal place of business means the business must be headquartered or have an established place or places of business in the incorporated limits of the city or the local area, as applicable, from which 20% or more of the entity's workforce are regularly based, and from which a substantial role in the entity's performance of a commercially useful function or a substantial part of its operations is conducted. A location utilized solely as a post office box, mail drop or telephone message center or any combination thereof, with no other substantial work function, shall not be construed as a principal place of business.

Sec. 15-177. Hire Houston First Program—Purchases of personal property.

- (a) Contracts of \$100,000 or more. In purchasing any personal property that is not affixed to real property, if the city receives one or more bids from a bidder that is a city business and whose bid is within three percent of the lowest bid price received by the city from a bidder who is not a city business, the city may enter into a contract with a value of \$100,000 or more with:
 - (1) The lowest bidder; or
 - (2) The bidder that is a city business, as defined in this article.
- (b) Contracts under \$100,000. In purchasing any personal property that is not affixed to real property, if the city receives one or more bids from a bidder that is a city business and whose bid is within five percent of the lowest bid price received by the city from a bidder that is not a city business, the city may enter into a contract for an expenditure of less than \$100,000 with:

- (1) The lowest bidder; or
- (2) The bidder that is a city business, as defined in this article.

Sec. 15-178. Hire Houston First Program—Purchases of services.

- (a) In procuring services, including construction services, the contracting department may grant a preference to a local business. In no event shall a contract for services be granted to a local business that is not within:
 - (1) Five percent of the lowest bidder for contracts under \$100,000; or
 - (2) Three percent of the lowest bidder for contracts of \$100,000 or more.
- (b) In procuring architectural, engineering or land surveying services under the Professional Services Procurement Act, Tex. Gov't Code, Sec. 2254.004, the contracting department may, when appropriate, consider the status of a provider as a local business as part of the qualifications determination.

Sec. 15-179. Hire Houston First Program—Purchases under \$50,000.

Subject to Texas Government Code §2254.004, when procuring goods or services valued at less than \$50,000 that are not the subject of a blanket purchase order or contract, the City shall select vendors and services providers with a principal place of business in the local area, provided that any such vendor's bid is no more than five percent greater than the lowest bid, in the event the lowest bid is from one other than a city business or a local business.

Sec. 15-180. Hire Houston First Program—Responsibilities and enforcement.

(a) The Mayor's Office for Business Opportunities (MOBO) shall be responsible for establishing the documentation necessary to establish a principal place of business in the city or local area. Any entity claiming to be a local business shall submit to the city a form promulgated by the MOBO, attested to by a duly authorized representative of the business. The MOBO shall make the final determination as to whether a business is a local business.

- (b) Department directors shall maintain written records of all departmental actions under this program. Departments are charged with primary responsibility for monitoring their contracts for compliance with the program.
- (c) The contracting or evaluating department shall award additional points to a local business in any bid based on a 'best value' evaluation.
- (d) The strategic purchasing division ("SPD") and MOBO, in consultation with the legal department, are directed to provide written guidance, including guidance on best value bids, to departments for implementing this article. Such guidance shall include a preference structure that grants the highest number of points to a city business, the next higher number of points to a local business, and no points to a business located outside of the city or local area.
- (e) The submission of a form pursuant to subsection (a) above found to contain false information is grounds for debarment per section 15-103(1)(c) of this Code.
- (f) The MOBO shall produce semi-annual reports, commencing July 1, 2012, summarizing the dollar amount of procurements awarded to city businesses and local businesses under this program.

Sec. 15-181. Hire Houston First Program—Exceptions.

- (a) This program does not apply to any contract in which the federal government participates in the form of a grant or loan, or the city acts as a conduit for federal money.
- (b) This program does not apply to contracts in which the contracting department has determined that it would unduly interfere with contract needs. In cases of purchases over \$100,000, such determination shall be made in writing, expressly approved by the department director, and furnished in advance to the MOBO.
- (c) In accordance with Local Government Code section 271.9051, this program does not apply to the purchase of telecommunications services or information services, as those terms are defined by 47 U.S.C. Section 153."

Sec. 15-182. Hire Houston First Program—Effective Date.

This Article shall be effective as to solicitations for procurements published on or after September 1, 2011.

Section 3. That, if any provision, section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of this Ordinance, or the application of same to any person or set of circumstances, is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, void or invalid, the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance or their application to other persons or sets of circumstances shall not be affected thereby, it being the intent of the City Council in adopting this Ordinance that no portion hereof or provision or regulation contained herein shall become inoperative or fail by reason of any unconstitutionality, voidness or invalidity of any other portion hereof, and all provisions of this Ordinance are declared to be severable for that purpose.

Section 4. The City Attorney is hereby authorized to take all action necessary to enforce all legal obligations under the Program without further authorization from Council.

Section 5. That there exists a public emergency requiring that this Ordinance be passed finally on the date of its introduction as requested in writing by the Mayor; therefore, this Ordinance shall be passed finally on such date and shall take effect immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; however, in the event that the Mayor fails to sign this Ordinance within five days after its passage and adoption, it shall take effect in accordance with Article VI, Section 6, Houston City Charter.
