PROJECT NOTICE/JUSTIFICATION: This project included on-call construction or rehabilitation to primarily large diameter (24 inches in diameter and greater) water lines, valves and appurtenances at various locations in the City. The scope of work includes mobilizing and cooperating with City personnel to develop appropriate rehabilitation solutions, install remedies, provide bedding and backfilling of utilities, and restore surface around area of work. City issued work orders over a 24-month period.

DESCRIPTION/SCOPE: This contract was for rehabilitation to primarily large diameter water line utilities in various locations throughout the City of Houston. The scope of work was determined by work order from time to time on as-needed basis. The location of the work could not be determined at the time of bid and was established by work order. Drawings, appropriate specifications and geotechnical and environmental reports, as required or as available were provided with each work order. This project was designed by Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam, Inc., with 730 calendar days allowed for construction. The project was awarded to Reytec Construction Resources, Inc. with an original Contract Amount of \$1,400,000.00 and an adjustment factor of 1.050.

LOCATION: The project is located in various Key Map grids, including but not limited to the City of Houston, extra territorial jurisdictions, and strategic partnership agreements.

CONTRACT COMPLETION AND COST: The Contractor, Reytec Construction Resources, Inc. has completed the Work under subject Contract. The project was completed within the Contract Time. The final cost of the project, including overrun and underrun of estimated bid quantities and previously approved Change Order Nos. 1 and 2 is \$1,407,063.16, an increase of \$7,063.16 or 0.50% over the original Contract Amount.

The increased cost is primarily due to Change Order Nos. 1 and 2.

<u>M/WBE PARTICIPATION:</u> The M/W/SBE goal for this project was 22.00%. According to Affirmative Action and Contract Compliance Division, the actual participation was 24.03%. The Contractor was awarded an "Outstanding" rating for the M/W/SBE compliance.

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
<u>Landowners' Testimony Before the Special Commissioners:</u> \$180,802.00 (i.e. \$15.50 psf for the land being acquired; \$19,534.00 for the improvements thereon; \$141,862.00 for damage to the remainder)

<u>Award of Special Commissioners:</u> \$74,440.00 The landowners' legal representative promptly filed Objections to the Award of Special Commissioners and the matter was placed on the Court's jury trial docket.

In anticipation of trial, the Legal Department retained a different appraiser to value the property and testify at trial. This appraiser opined the landowners are entitled to \$73,355.00 as just compensation for the City's taking. The landowner's retained the same appraiser for trial and their value conclusions remain unchanged from the Special Commissioners' hearing. The pivotal issue in this case centers around the issue and degree of damage to the remainder caused by the City taking. The parties have divergent opinions regarding the extent of remainder damages, and the solutions and options for lessening the impact of the City's taking on the landowner's business and property. The parties initiated pre-trial discovery and proceeded to prepare for a trial on the merits of the case.

During the course of trial preparation, the parties were able to reconcile their differences and arrive at a negotiated settlement proposal wherein all issues and matter in controversy were resolved. The proposed settlement, subject to City Council's approval, provides that the City will pay the total sum of \$100,000.00 in this case. The proposed settlement is \$25,560.00 more than the amount of the Award of Special Commissioners and is supported by the evidence available to this office. The proposed settlement is well within the range of evidence available and it is doubtful the City would benefit from further litigating this matter.

We recommend that the City Attorney be authorized, by Motion, to settle this case for \$100,000.00 being \$25,560.00 over the amount of the Award of Special Commissioners. Funding will be provided by a previously approved blanket Appropriation Ordinance.



SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The Ella Boulevard (Wheatley) Paving Project (Little York - W. Gulf Bank) provides for the right-of-way acquisition, design and construction of a four lane divided concrete roadway with storm drainage, curbs, sidewalks, driveways, street lighting, traffic control and the necessary underground utilities. The project includes crossings over Harris County Flood Control ditches. The project will replace and widen a street that has deteriorated beyond economic repair and normal maintenance. It will improve traffic circulation, mobility and drainage in the service area. The improvements will upgrade the existing roadway to Major Thoroughfare Standards.

This matter involves the acquisition of a permanent easement in and to 1,524 square feet (0.0322 acre) of land. The property is located at 8811 Wheatley Street and is owned by Mary Goodie. The property is improved with a 1,610 square-foot single family dwelling and related appurtenances. The City's taking is a rectangularly shaped tract of land 20.11 feet in width by 69.79 feet in length along Wheatley Street and will bring the new right-of-way line within ten (10') of the residence. The City's final offer of \$73,355.00 to purchase the needed property was withdrawn due to title and boundary problems and the matter was referred to the Legal Department to initiate eminent domain proceedings to acquire the property. The Legal Department addressed and resolved the title and boundary issues, and the landowner agreed to convey the property by deed for \$75,000.00. The purchase is supported by the evidence available to this office, and eliminates the need/costs of initiating a condemnation proceeding.

It is being recommended that the City Attorney be authorized, by Motion, to purchase Parcel AY10-026 from Mary Goodie for \$75,000.00 in lieu of condemnation. Funding will be provided by a previously approved blanket Appropriation Ordinance.



SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The City Purchasing Agent recommends that City Council amend Council Motion 2008-0380, passed June 4, 2008, to increase the spending authority for chemical, liquid ammonium sulfate awarded to ALTIVIA Corporation, from \$229,724.95 to \$321,614.93. The additional spending authority is needed to sustain the Department until the end of the awarded term or until new award is put in place. The extreme and prolonged dry weather conditions and numerous ruptured water mains increased the volume of ground water to be treated and distributed citywide, thus causing the spending authority limit to be exhausted prior to the end of the awarded term.

This award began June 12, 2008 for a 60-month period, with two option years to extend, in an amount not to exceed \$229,724.95. Expenditures as of September 30, 2011 totaled \$194,784.50. All terms and conditions shall remain as originally approved by City Council.

The award consisted of approximately 2,524,450 pounds of liquid ammonium sulfate, which is utilized on a daily basis by the Department's Drinking Water Operations Branch to prevent the formation of carcinogenic compounds during the treatment of potable water at groundwater plants and re-pump stations located citywide. Liquid ammonium sulfate is essential to comply with the regulations promulgated by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and the Environmental Protection Agency to preserve and protect the public's health and safety.

The solicitation was issued with a 11% M/WBE participation goal. The supplier is currently achieving 4.72%. The Office of Business Opportunity met with the supplier to help them identify alternative subcontractors and opportunities for M/WBE firms and will continue to monitor and work with the supplier to achieve the established M/WBE goal.

City of Houston Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone Number Five ("Zone") was created by Ordinance No. 1996-1337 on December 18, 1996. Subsequently, on May 21, 1997, by Ordinance No.1997-594, City Council approved a Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for the Zone ("Plan") for the Zone and created the Memorial-Heights Redevelopment Authority by Resolution No. 1997-0067 on December 10, 1997 to help implement the Plan. The City subsequently enlarged the boundaries of the Zone by Ordinance 2007-1142 on October 10, 2007, again by Ordinance 2008-1204 on December 17, 2008, and again by Ordinance 2009-235 on March 25, 2009. It is recommended that the boundaries of the Zone be reduced by approximately 253 acres. The proposed area to be removed consists of public right-of-way along the Buffalo Bayou bounded generally by Shepherd Street, Sabine Street, Allen Parkway, and Memorial Drive and including Spotts Park. Removal of this area will enable the Zone to focus its financial resources on physical improvements including reclamation and flood remediation infrastructure along the lower reaches of the White Oak Bayou channel. Subject: TIRZ Actions Year End 2011

On February 23, 2011 City Council approved a Tri-Party Development Agreement between the Buffalo Bayou Partnership, Harris County Flood Control District, and the City of Houston for the Buffalo Bayou Park Project. The proposed project consists of the area of Buffalo Bayou generally bounded by Shepherd Street on the west, Sabine Street on the east, Allen Parkway on the south and Memorial Drive on the north. The project will improve the park area, provide for flood management for the Buffalo Bayou and enhance recreational, environmental and natural features within the proposed park. The site development plans also include provisions for restaurants, entertainment and concessions.

The Tri-Party Agreement set forth the criteria to develop agreements for future construction and operation of the park. We will bring definitive agreements for City Council and Commissioners Court approval in November. These agreements will require changes to boundaries and project plans for TIRZ 3 & 5, which are set out below:

TIRZ No. 3 - Main Street/Market Square:

A request to amend the Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for Main Street/Market Square TIRZ to restate the goals and objectives included in the original plan and subsequent amendments including addressing problems related to the reconstruction of key streets and utility systems, transit improvements, residential and retail site development, property acquisition, historic preservation, theater district, cultural, public and institutional facility improvements, economic development grants, parks and bayou parkland improvements. New goals included in the amended plan include provisions for upgrading public green space and creating attractive, safe, pedestrian environments for retail, restaurant, recreational and cultural activities. The amended Plan also enlarges the Zone's boundary by approximately 300 acres. The area proposed annexed could be characterized as areas subject to periodic inundation from the Buffalo Bayou, and areas characterized by deteriorating site improvements and conditions that endanger life and property. As part of the amended plan it is also recommended that the duration of the Zone be extended to December 31, 2043. The amended plan, the proposed annexation and Zone term extension will provide the tools needed to facilitate the development of the Buffalo Bayou Park Project including annual maintenance expenditures for Buffalo Bayou Park estimated at \$2m.


TIRZ No. 5 (Memorial Heights Zone):


A request to amend the Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for this TIRZ to restate the goals and objectives included in the original plan and subsequent amendments, including the design and construction of public infrastructure such as public streets and utility systems, parks, hike and bike trails, pedestrian bridges, the redevelopment of cultural and public facilities, and affordable housing. New goals include provisions for the design and construction of flood remediation infrastructure, reclamation projects and floodway drainage and detention facilities.

The amended plan provides for the reduction of the boundaries of the Zone. The proposed area to be removed consists of public right-of-ways along Buffalo Bayou generally bounded by Shepherd Street, Sabine Street, Allen Parkway and Memorial Drive. Removal of the territory will allow the Zone to better concentrate its financial resources on reclamation and flood remediation improvements along the lower reaches of the White Oak Bayou channel. The territory to be removed from the boundaries of the Memorial Heights Zone will subsequently be annexed into the Main Street/Market Square Zone.

Introduction

The Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan and amendments ("Plans") for Reinvestment Zone Number Five, City of Houston, Texas ("Zone") sets forth goals, expectations, and redevelopment plans and programs to create and support an environment attractive to private investment in the greater Memorial Heights area and in portions of the Buffalo Bayou and the White Oak Bayou inner loop recreational corridor. The intent of the Plans is to implement improvements that will result in the long-term stability and viability of the area.

The Zone was created by Ordinance No. 96-1337, on December 18, 1996, to facilitate the master-planned, mixed-use, residential redevelopment of approximately 112 acres bounded generally by Washington Avenue, Washington Cemetery, Memorial Drive, and Heights Boulevard. The Plans were adopted by City Council on May 21, 1997 by Ordinance No. 1997-594 ("Part A Plan"). In the Part A Plan, two alternatives were identified that were predicated on the relocation/abandonment of an existing rail spur. Because the he rail spur was not abandoned within a time frame that would allow the development contemplated, the Plans were amended on August 11, 1999 by City Council by Ordinance No. 1999-823 ("Part B Plan").

On October 10, 2007, City Council approved the annexation of approximately 800 acres into the Zone by Ordinance No. 2007-1142, and approved the Second Amended Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan by Ordinance No. 2008-784 on September 3, 2008 ("Part C Plan"). On December 17, 2008, City Council approved a second annexation of 38.4 acres into the Zone by Ordinance No. 2008-1204, for a proposed mixed-used development. On March 25, 2009, an additional .10 acres consisting of sidewalk/public trail access easements was added to the Zone's boundaries by Ordinance No. 2009-235. On April 8, 2009, City Council approved the Third Amended Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan by Ordinance No. 2009-299, ("Part D Plan"). On December 8, 2010, City Council approved the Fourth Amended Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan by Ordinance No. 2010-997 for the Zone ("Part E Plan).

This Fifth Amendment to the Plans ("Part F" Plan) consists of two parts, Section One and Section Two.

Section One:

The Part A Plan: The Part A Plan covered approximately 112 acres bounded generally by Washington Avenue, Washington Cemetery, Memorial Drive, and Heights Boulevard. The Part A Plan contemplated the financing and management tools needed to help alleviate blight, deteriorated site conditions, relieve obsolete platting; and encourage sound growth of residential development and supporting uses within the Zone. The aforementioned goals were to be achieved primarily through the financing of:

- Real property assemblage and associated costs
- Environmental remediation
- Public utilities including water, sewer, and drainage facilities
- Utility Impact Fees
- Paving
- Landscaping
- Improvements to Spotts Park
- Intersection improvements
- Pedestrian Bridge and improvements to tie into Houston Bikeways/Memorial Trail system.

Much of what was formerly vacant land previously occupied by industrial uses has been converted into high-density residential and commercial development. This development, which occurred within the

original boundaries of the Zone, has acted as a catalyst for additional redevelopment throughout the surrounding area. A new initiative proposed to occur within the original boundaries of the Zone will convert an additional 28 acres of multi-family housing from 616 units to an estimated 1,860 units. The Zone will continue to implement and pay for the project costs for the Part A Plan.

The Part B Plan: The Part B Plan both restated and further defined the fundamental goals and objectives identified in the Part A Plan. However, the primary intent of the Part B Plan was to reflect the inclusion of Houston Independent School District's ("HISD") participation in the Zone.

The Part C Plan: The Second Amendment to the Plans included provisions for a Zone area expansion and projects for the enhancement of and improvements to the newly annexed public land. The geographic area covered by the Part C Plan includes the areas covered by the Part A and Part B Plans, as well as the recently annexed 800 acres of land.

The Part D Plan: The Third Amended Project Plan includes provisions for a Zone area expansion and projects for the enhancement of and improvements to the newly annexed territory. The geographic area covered by the Part D Plan includes the areas covered by the Part A, Part B, and Part C Plans, as well as the approximately 39 acres of land recently annexed at Regent Square and sidewalk/trail easements at Studemont Street and Memorial Drive. The proposed improvements in the annexed area are associated with the Regent Square project and will allow the Zone to enter into a development agreement with the owner of most of this property to develop a mixed-use project that includes for-sale and rental residential units, retail and restaurant development, and office space. The development agreement would reimburse the developer for various public improvements including, but not limited to, underground utility improvements (water, wastewater, and storm drainage), street lighting and landscaping, sidewalks, and utility impact fees. Public improvements proposed in the Part D Plan relate to the original goals of the Zone. Part D Plan tax increment revenues that are not utilized for the project costs associated with the Part D Plan annexed area may be utilized for project costs in the Part A Plan, Part B Plan, and Part C Plan areas of the Zone.

The Part E Plan: The Part E Plan includes provisions in anticipation of funds associated with extending the duration of the Zone. The additional funds derived from the Part E Plan will be utilized for public improvement project costs consistent with the Part A, Part B, Part C, and Part D Plans. Additionally, funding increases for other project costs, administrative expenses, and operational costs were included, resulting in an overall increase in project costs of \$47,797,291.

Section Two:

The Zone and the City now desire to further amend the Plans as described herein ("Part F Plan"). The Part F Plan provides for enhancement of and improvements in the Zone, and contemplates reducing the boundaries of the Zone by approximately 253 acres of land that was previously included in the Part A-Part E Plans. The Part A-F Plans combined will provide the necessary tools to alleviate blight, deteriorated street and site conditions, and obsolete public services and facilities and will encourage growth of residential, retail, and commercial development within the Zone.

The Part F Plan:

Goals: Public improvements proposed in the Part F Plan relate to the goals of the Original and amended Plans and are as follows:

Goal 1: Infrastructure Improvements:

Public streets and public utility systems are required to create an environment that will stimulate private investment in retail, residential, and multi-family developments. Reconstruction (major and minor) of key streets and utility systems will be undertaken to enhance the level of service in the area, improve functionality, replace aged facilities, and increase aesthetics. All roadway improvements will be integrated with street reconstruction projects of the City of Houston and others, as needed, and where possible, include elements not included in those programs.

Goal 2: Parks and Related Amenities:

The creation of pedestrian-friendly safe environments, public open green space, and access and egress improvements including land acquisition, dedication of public easements, parking, and the construction of enhancements with an emphasis on the watershed of the Lower White Oak Bayou, are important components of the Part F Plan. All improvements will be integrated with adjacent land uses and provide upgrades focused on connectivity, pedestrian safety, and the visual environment.

Goal 3: Non-Vehicular/Multi-Modal Transportation Systems:

Development of on-road and off-road hike and bike trails including sidewalks, pedestrian bridges, lighting, street trees, landscaping, wayfinding signage, benches, street furniture, public art and other pedestrian amenities. Improvements include establishment of off-street hike and bike lanes where adequate right-of-way/public easements are available, widening of existing sidewalks/roadway bridge decks to accommodate both pedestrian and bicyclists, and modification of lane design within existing pavement.

Goal 4: Cultural and Public Facilities:

Efforts to enhance the quality of life of area residents through the rehabilitation of cultural and public facilities are anticipated in the Part F Plan. Repositioning of historic cemeteries is a component part of this category.

Goal 5: Drainage and Detention Facilities:

The fundamental goal of the Part F Plan will be to address issues related to storm water management. This will be achieved through the construction of flood mitigation utility systems, including the design and construction of new storm water systems, retention basins, channel and environmental/ecological restoration projects, reclamation and other methodologies proven to reduce volumes of runoff from drainage areas. Flood risk management will be implemented so as to minimize increased risk of flooding either locally or elsewhere.

Goal 6: Affordable Housing:

Provisions for a commitment to the City of Houston for an affordable housing contribution is included in the Part F Plan.

Project Plan and Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan for the Zone

A. Project Plan

Existing Uses of Land (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(1)): Map 1 (attached) depicts the existing land and proposed uses in the Zone. The existing and proposed land uses include multi-family residential,

commercial, office, public and institutional, transportation and utility, park and open spaces, and undeveloped land uses.

Proposed Changes of Zoning Ordinances, Master Plan of Municipality, Building Codes, and other Municipal Ordinances (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(2)): All construction will be performed in conformance with the City's existing rules and regulations. There are no proposed changes to any City ordinance, master plan, or building code.

Estimated Non-Project Costs (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(3)): Resolution 1997-0001, adopted by City Council on January 8, 1997, created the Memorial Heights Public Improvement District (PID). The viability of submitting to City Council a PID Assessment has been discussed among single family and multi-family residents within the original boundaries of the Zone. No known assessment rate or collection amount is known at this time.

Method of Relocating Persons to be Displaced, if any, as a Result of Implementing the Plan (Texas Tax Code §311.011(b)(4)): It is not anticipated that any residents will be displaced by any of the projects to be undertaken in the Zone.

B. Reinvestment Zone Financing Plan

Estimated Project Costs (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(1)): Exhibit 1 (attached) details the proposed public improvement and administrative project costs. The dollar amounts are approximate and may be amended from time to time by City Council. The financing costs are a function of project financing needs and will vary with market conditions from the estimates shown on Exhibit 1. The estimated project descriptions in the Part A Plan, Part B Plan, Part C Plan, Part D Plan, and Part E Plan remain valid for those projects at this time.

Proposed Kind, Number, and Location of all Proposed Public Works or Public Improvements to be Financed in the Zone (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(2)): These details are described throughout the Plan.

Economic Feasibility (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(3)): An economic feasibility study was completed for the Memorial Heights area in 1996 by CDS Market Research. The study documents the economic potential of the Zone. Exhibits 2 through 5 constitute incremental revenue estimates for the Zone. The incremental revenue estimates are projected to be sufficient to cover the costs of the proposed redevelopment and infrastructure improvements in the Zone. The Plan estimates total project costs of \$139,680,493. The Zoneand the City find and determine that the Part A Plan, Part B Plan, Part C Plan, Part D Plan, Part E Plan, and Part F Plan are economically feasible.

Estimated Amount of Bond Indebtedness: Estimated Time When Related Costs or Monetary Obligations Incurred (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(4), §311.011(c)(5)): Issuance of notes and bonds by the Zone will occur as tax increment revenues allow. The value and timing of the issuance of notes or bonds will correlate to debt capacity as derived from the attached revenue and project schedules, as well as actual market conditions for the issue and sale of such notes and bonds.

Methods and Sources of Financing Project Costs and Percentage of Increment from Taxing Units Anticipated to Contribute Tax Increment to the Zone (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(6)): Methods and sources of financing include the issuance of notes and bonds, as well as collaboration with developers and other entities for grant funding and partnerships. Tax Year 1997 was the base year for the Zone, and Tax Year 2029 is the scheduled termination date. As outlined in Exhibits 2 through 5, at least \$82.7 million of increment is estimated to be generated by the Zone for use in funding project costs. This figure is calculated using an estimated collection rate of 95% and a City contribution of \$0.63875/\$100 of assessed

valuation in the Original and 2007, 2008, and 2009 Annexed Areas and, a HISD contribution of \$1.15670/\$100 of assessed valuation in the Original Area. HISD participation in the Zone will terminate with the collection of the Tax Year 2017 increment payment.

<u>Current Total Appraised Value of Taxable Real Property</u> (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(7)): The current projected appraised value of taxable real property in the Zone as of April 15, 2011 is \$365,975.043.

Estimated Captured Appraised Value of Zone During Each Year of Existence (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(8)): The estimated captured appraised value for the remaining duration of the Zone is set forth in Exhibit 2.

Zone Duration (Texas Tax Code §311.011(c)(9)): When the Zone was initially created by City Council on December 10, 1997, its duration was established at 19 years. Due to the magnitude of development within and adjacent to the Zone and the increased demand on the already-distressed infrastructure, by Ordinance 2010-996, adopted by City Council on December 8, 2010, the duration of the Zone was extended to December 31, 2029.

SPECIFIC EXPLANATION:

The City Purchasing Agent recommends that City Council approve an amending ordinance to increase the maximum contract amount from \$23,431,560.96 to \$29,431,560.96 for a sole source contract between the City of Houston and Northrop Grumman Systems Corporation (NGSC) for maintenance and operational support of the consolidated dispatching system (CDS) at the Houston Emergency Center (HEC) and authorize approval of a second amendment to extend the contract term from January 1, 2012 to January 1, 2016.

This contract was originally awarded by Council on August 29, 2001, per Ordinance No. 2001-0818, in the original amount of \$12,363,291.00. On July 16, 2003, per Council Motion No. 2003-0897, City Council approved Change Order No. 1 for \$903,530.16. On October 1, 2003, per Council Motion No. 2003-1167, City Council approved additional funds in the amount of \$664,000.00, to authorize the purchase of preventive maintenance and operational support services (OSS) maintenance, which had not been provided for in the maintenance component of the original five-year contract. On January 25, 2006, per Ordinance No. 2006-087, City Council approved additional funds in the amount of \$4,372,843.61 for NGSC maintenance support for the CDS and records management system through January 2, 2009. On December 30, 2008, per Ordinance No. 2008-1225, City Council approved additional funds in the amount of \$5,127,896.19 for the continuation of NGSC maintenance support for the CDS and records management system and authorized a first amendment to extend the contract term through January 1, 2012.

The funding increase and contract extension shall allow the City to continue to receive software maintenance and support for this critical system beyond the expiration of the current contract term while the economic climate at the City improves enough to reduce the City's overall budget deficit and allow for the procurement and implementation of an entirely new system for HEC.

The scope of work requires the contractor to provide basic software maintenance, preventative maintenance, and OSS maintenance for the CDS. The CDS provides the means for the Houston Police and Fire Departments to use combined Computer Aided Dispatching (CAD) technology to assist with assigning and managing calls for service to the most appropriate Police and Fire/EMS first responders. The CDS utilizes CAD technology to electronically

PROJECT DESCRIPTION: The scope of work consists of the renovation of the existing two-story facility to bring it into compliance with the City of Houston Building Code, ADA and the Texas Accessibility Standards. Under the design contract, a structural assessment was performed and it was determined that extensive structural stabilization was required to bring the building into compliance with the code prescribed wind loads. Economic Development Agreement Between the City of Houston, Texas, and Kroger Texas L.P.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

This **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT** ("Agreement") by and between the **CITY OF HOUSTON, TEXAS,** a Texas home-rule municipal corporation ("City"), and **KROGER TEXAS L.P.**, an Ohio limited partnership ("Developer"), is entered into as of the Effective Date as defined herein.

WHEREAS, Developer owns certain tracts of land totaling approximately 8.5658 acres within the corporate limits of the City, as depicted on the site survey marked as Exhibit "A" attached hereto ("Land"), for the purpose of developing and constructing an approximately 79,000 square foot combination grocery and drug store and fuel station ("Project"); and

WHEREAS, Developer has entered into a Ground Lease Agreement dated July 26, 2011, granting a leasehold interest in the Land to its affiliate Kroger Management -- NMTC Houston I, LLC, an Ohio limited liability company ("Project Owner");

WHEREAS, Project Owner will construct and own real property improvements located on the Land ("Project Improvements") and will provide and own furniture, fixtures and equipment ("Project FFE") located thereon and necessary for the operation of the Project; and

WHEREAS, Project Owner will lease the Project Improvements and the Project FFE and will sublease the Land to its affiliate Kroger 017 Operator, Inc. ("Project Operator"), which will operate the Project, including ownership of inventory items and other personal property located at the Project ("Project Inventory"); and

WHEREAS, the City acknowledges and desires that the Developer shall provide valuable services to the City through the work described in this Agreement, including but not limited to the development of public works and improvements, including water, sewer, drainage, road and street improvements, traffic signals and other mobility improvements and public infrastructure to benefit the Project and to serve the City generally and the surrounding community specifically; and

WHEREAS, the City has established a program in accordance with Article III, Chapter 52-a of the Texas Constitution and Chapter 380 of the Texas Local Government Code ("Chapter 380") authorizing the City to use public funds for the public purposes of promoting local economic development and stimulating business and commercial activity within the City of Houston, including the authority to enter into sales and use tax rebate agreements such as this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City recognizes the positive economic impact that the Project will bring to the City through the timely development and diversification of the economy, elimination of unemployment and underemployment through the creation and retention

of new jobs, the attraction of new businesses, and the retention and growth of the ad valorem and sales and use tax revenues generated by the Project for the City; and

WHEREAS, the City and Developer desire to work together to advance the public purposes of developing and diversifying the economy of the state, eliminating unemployment or underemployment in the state, and developing or expanding transportation or commerce in the state; and

WHEREAS, in consideration of Developer causing the design, timely construction, development, financing, and operation of the Project and related public infrastructure improvements, in accordance with the performance standards described herein and including commercially reasonable efforts to hire local and disadvantaged businesses and buying local products in constructing the public infrastructure improvements, which will result in the creation of new jobs and additional sales and use tax and ad valorem tax revenues for the City, the City agrees to purchase the public infrastructure improvements from the Developer based on the costs of the improvements by granting to Developer, pursuant to Chapter 380 and other applicable law, a reimbursement of the incremental sales and use tax revenues and the increase above the base year ad valorem tax revenues generated by the Project, the terms and conditions of which are more fully described in this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City has concluded and hereby finds that this Agreement promotes economic development in the City of Houston and therefore meets the requirements of Chapter 380 and the City's established economic development program, and is in the City's best interests;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals and the mutual promises, agreements, services, obligations, covenants, and benefits set forth in this Agreement, the City and Developer agree and contract as follows:

ARTICLE I DEFINITIONS AND TERMS

- A. <u>Incorporation of Recitals and Exhibits</u>. The recitals in this Agreement and the Exhibits attached to this Agreement are hereby incorporated for all purposes. In the event of any conflict between any of the provisions of the Exhibits and the provisions of this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall prevail.
- B. <u>Singular and Plural</u>. Words used herein in the singular, where the context so permits, also include the plural and vice versa. The definitions of words in the singular herein also apply to such words when used in the plural where the context so permits and vice versa.
- C. <u>Definitions and Terms</u>. The terms "Agreement," "Chapter 380," "City," "Developer," "Land," "Project," "Project FFE," "Project Improvements," "Project Inventory," "Project Operator," and "Project Owner" shall have the meanings set forth above, and the terms defined below shall have the meanings set forth below.

"Base Property Tax" means the amount of ad valorem taxes levied and collected by the City on the Property based on the total taxable appraised value of the Property as of January 1st of the respective year in which Developer commences construction of the Project.

"Base Sales Tax" means the amount of Sales Tax Revenues received by the City for the calendar quarter preceding the Effective Date.

"Effective Date" means the date that the City Controller countersigns this Agreement, as shown on the execution page of this Agreement.

"Exhibit 'A" refers to the attached survey/map of the Land.

"Exhibit 'B'" refers to the attached preliminary list of City Improvements.

"Exhibit 'C" refers to the attached conceptual site plan for the Project.

"Exhibit 'D'" refers to the attached depiction of the landscaping to be performed on the esplanades/medians on Studemont Street.

"Exhibit 'E'" refers to the attached form of release necessary to allow the State Comptroller to provide the Sales Tax Disclosure.

"City Improvements" means certain public water, sewer, drainage, road, traffic signal, right-of-way, landscaping, irrigation, sidewalk and other related improvements located in the public right of way and necessary to serve the Project as and when needed. A preliminary list of City Improvements is attached hereto as **Exhibit "B."**

"City Improvements Cost" means all costs of acquisition, design, development, and construction of the City Improvements including, without limitation: (i) the acquisition cost of any land that is part of the City Improvements; (ii) all costs of design, engineering, materials, labor, construction, testing and inspection and other services, arising in connection with the design and construction of the City Improvements; (iii) all payments arising under any contracts entered into for the design or construction of the City Improvements; (iv) all costs incurred in connection with obtaining governmental approvals, certificates, and permits required in connection with the construction of the City Improvements; and (v) costs to acquire any rights-of-way.

"Interest" means interest (i) that accrues at a rate of 5.17% per annum, (ii) that is computed quarterly on the last day of each calendar quarter beginning with the first calendar quarter that includes the Reimbursement Date, and (iii) that is computed based on a principal amount equal to the amount by which the City Improvements Cost exceeds all payments that the City has made to the Developer pursuant to paragraph (B)(4) of Article VI of this Agreement as of the Interest computation date.

"Maximum Reimbursement Amount" means (A) the lesser of (i) \$2,500,000 or (ii) the City Improvements Cost plus (B) Interest.

"Party" or "Parties" means the City and Developer.

"Property" means the Land, the Project FFE, the Project Improvements, the Project Inventory, and any other real property improvements or personal property that is located on the Land and part of the Project.

"Reimbursement Amount" means the Sales Tax Revenues in excess of the Base Sales Tax and 100% of the City's portion of the amount of incremental increase in ad valorem taxes imposed on the Property above the Base Property Tax, with the total Reimbursement Amount not to exceed the Maximum Reimbursement Amount during the Term of this Agreement.

"Reimbursement Date" means the date on which the Developer receives from the City a certificate of occupancy for the Project for use and occupancy of the Project for its intended purpose as a combination grocery and drug store and fuel station.

"Reimbursement Fund" means the special fund created by the City as described in Article VI of this Agreement.

"Sales Tax Revenues" means the amount of sales and use tax received by the City pursuant to Chapter 321, Texas Tax Code, from the sale of Taxable Items at the Project, from the construction of the City Improvements or Project Improvements, or from purchases of Project FFE and Project Inventory.

"Taxable Items" has the meaning assigned by Chapter 151, Texas Tax Code, as it may be amended from time to time.

"Term" means the period of time beginning on the Effective Date and continuing until the earlier of either the payment to Developer of the Maximum Reimbursement Amount or the expiration of thirteen (13) years from the date on which the City issues a certificate of occupancy for the Project Improvements for use and occupancy of the Project Improvements for the Project's intended purpose as a grocery and drug store.

ARTICLE II THE PROJECT

Developer intends to cause the construction of the Project, an approximately 79,000 square foot combination grocery and drug store and fuel station located just south of Interstate 10 at the intersection of Studemont and Summer streets in

Houston, Texas. A Conceptual Site Plan for the Project is attached hereto as Exhibit "C."

ARTICLE III REPRESENTATIONS AND WARRANTIES

- (1) The City hereby represents and warrants to Developer that the City has full constitutional and lawful right, power and authority, under current applicable law, to execute and deliver and perform the terms and obligations of this Agreement, and all of the foregoing have been or will be duly and validly authorized and approved by all necessary City proceedings, findings, and actions. Accordingly, this Agreement constitutes the legal, valid, and binding obligation of the City, is enforceable in accordance with its terms and provisions, and does not require the consent of any other governmental authority.
- (2) Developer hereby represents and warrants to the City that Developer has full constitutional and lawful right, power, and authority, under current applicable law, to execute and deliver and perform the terms and obligations of this Agreement, and all of the foregoing have been or will be duly and validly authorized and approved by all actions necessary. Accordingly, this Agreement constitutes the legal, valid, and binding obligation of Developer, is enforceable in accordance with its terms and provisions, and does not require the consent of any other authority or entity.

ARTICLE IV DEVELOPER COMMITMENTS

- A. <u>Design of the Project.</u> Developer agrees to design the Project in an architectural style that, in Developer's sole discretion, is harmonious with the general architectural style of the surrounding Heights neighborhoods. Developer shall satisfy all permitting requirements, including, but not limited to, Chapter 9 of the City's Department of Public Works and Engineering Infrastructure Design Manual and building permitting requirements. Prior to initiating construction of the City Improvements, Developer's engineer shall certify to the Chief Development Officer of the City that the Project complies with all applicable laws, ordinances, rules and regulations pertaining to the rate of storm water runoff from the Property.
- B. <u>Community Meetings.</u> Prior to commencing construction of the Project, Developer agrees to conduct at least one public meeting to provide information to and answer questions from the public and to provide an opportunity for interested persons to speak for or against the Project.
- C. <u>City Improvements.</u> Developer agrees to design and construct the City Improvements necessary to serve the Project as and when needed. The preliminary list of the City Improvements is set forth in **Exhibit "B,"** which may be modified at any time by mutual agreement of the Mayor, or his or her designee, and Developer, to modify, add, or remove City Improvements if the Mayor or Developer

determines that the modification, addition, or removal is necessary to achieve the intent of this Agreement and if such modification, addition, or removal is not estimated to cause the City Improvements Cost to exceed \$2,500,000. The dollar amounts of the City Improvements listed in **Exhibit "B"** are estimates of probable costs; actual costs may be higher or lower. The City Improvements include certain off-site improvements such as sanitary sewer, sidewalk, and street and landscaping improvements. Acquisition of right-of-way is required for some City Improvements.

- D. Standards and Approvals. Developer agrees that the plans and specifications for the City Improvements shall be subject to the review and approval of all governmental entities with jurisdiction, including, without limitation, the City. Developer agrees to comply with all applicable legal requirements from such jurisdictions. Before commencing construction of any City Improvements, Developer will submit to the City's Director of the Department of Public Works and Engineering, or his or her designee ("Director"), all plans and specifications for the construction of such City Improvements and obtain the Director's approval of such plans and specifications which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld and shall be decided upon expeditiously. In the event that the Director does not render a decision regarding approval of such plans and specifications within fifteen (15) days of receipt from Developer, such plans and specifications shall automatically be deemed approved. All water wells, water meters, flushing valves, valves, pipes, and appurtenances thereto, will conform exactly to the City's specifications. All water service lines, sewer service lines, lift stations, sewage treatment facilities, road facilities, and appurtenances thereto, will comply with the City's standard plans and specifications as amended from time to time. Prior to construction of any City Improvements, Developer or its engineer will give written notice by registered or certified mail to the Director stating the date that construction will be commenced. Construction of the City Improvements will be in accordance with the approved plans and specifications, and with the City's applicable standards and specifications, and during the progress of the construction and installation of the City Improvements, the Director may conduct periodic, on-the-ground inspections.
- E. <u>Summer Street.</u> Developer agrees to rehabilitate Summer Street and its adjoining sidewalks from Studemont Street to Givens Street and to construct and extend a new segment of Summer Street from Givens Street to Diesel Street.
- F. <u>Esplanade/Median Landscaping.</u> Developer agrees to develop or enhance the landscaping on the esplanades/medians on Studemont Street to beautify the surrounding community as depicted in attached **Exhibit "D."**
- G. <u>Job Creation</u>. Developer's receipt of the Reimbursement Amount is subject to the following commitment ("Job Creation Condition"): Developer agrees to create at least 170 jobs at this Project, effective as of the date on which the Project commences operations as a combination grocery and drug store. As used herein, the term "jobs" shall mean persons employed by Developer, the Project Operator, or any

other affiliate of Developer on a full- or part-time basis to perform services at the Project in connection with the operation of the Project. Developer shall annually submit documentation as reasonably necessary to evidence that Developer has satisfied the Job Creation Condition.

If Developer does not satisfy the Job Creation Condition for any period during the Term of this Agreement, and if such failure continues for sixty (60) days after written notice to Developer, the City may, as its sole and exclusive remedy, beginning on the date which is sixty (60) days after such written notice until Developer has provided evidence that it has satisfied the Job Creation Condition, reduce the Reimbursement Amount to be paid to Developer by a percentage by which the Developer does not satisfy the Job Creation Condition.

- H. Olivewood Cemetery. Developer agrees to donate forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) to Descendants of Olivewood, Inc. to be used for improvements to Olivewood Cemetery. Developer shall make such donation within a reasonable period of time following Developer's receipt of all necessary approvals, permits, and other authorizations necessary to commence construction of the Project.
- I. <u>Sidewalks and Trees.</u> Developer agrees to work with the City to (1) design and construct sidewalks that are wider than the standard requirement of four (4) feet; and (2) plant trees along Studemont Street and Summer Street that are larger in caliper than the standard requirement of one and one-half (1.5) inches. The City agrees that such sidewalks or trees will be Improvements and shall be reimbursable to the Developer subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- J. Payment of Project Costs. Developer agrees to pay (or cause to be paid) all costs of acquisition, design, development, and construction of the Project as such costs become due, including, without limitation: (i) all costs of design, engineering, materials, labor, construction, testing and inspection and legal or other consultant services, arising in connection with the design and construction of the Project; (ii) all payments arising under any contracts entered into for the design or construction of the Project; (iii) all costs incurred in connection with obtaining governmental approvals, certificates, and permits required in connection with the construction of the Project; (iv) Developer's share of costs to acquire any rights-of-way (recognizing that the City also will incur and be responsible for some costs of acquiring rights-of-way); and (v) costs in connection with the negotiation, preparation, and approval of this Agreement and all matters related thereto.
- K. <u>Competitive Bidding.</u> Construction contracts for the City Improvements shall not be subject to the City's competitive procurement requirements. After preparation of final plans and specifications and their approvals as required herein, Developer shall advertise for or solicit bids for construction as described in the final plans and specifications.
- L. <u>Sales Tax Disclosure</u>. The City agrees to request from the State Comptroller sales tax reports as provided in Section 321.3022, Texas Tax Code,

establishing the amount of Sales Tax Revenues for each calendar quarter during the Term ("Sales Tax Disclosure"). Developer agrees to provide any release or releases to the City necessary to allow the State Comptroller to provide the Sales Tax Disclosure. The City and Developer shall rely on the Sales Tax Disclosure as accurate and definitive for purposes of this Agreement. A form of release is attached hereto as **Exhibit E**. The City shall not be required to pay Developer the Reimbursement Amount until such time that Developer provides any required release and the State Comptroller provides the City the Sales Tax Disclosure; provided, however, the Developer may establish the amount of Sales Tax Revenues arising from the construction of the Project Improvements or the purchase of the Project FFE or Project Inventory using other documentation approved by the City, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

M. <u>Developer Affiliates</u>. The Project Owner and the Project Operator may satisfy Developer's obligations under this Article IV.

ARTICLE V CONSTRUCTION SCHEDULE AND CRITERIA

- A. <u>Conditions of Grant.</u> The 380 Grant and the City's reimbursement to Developer is conditioned upon and subject to Developer complying with the agreements stated above, as well as the conditions and Construction Schedule described in this Article V.
- B. <u>Commencement of Development.</u> Developer agrees to commence the site work and construction of the Project no later than six (6) months after the Effective Date of this Agreement, subject to the *force majeure* provisions of Article VII herein.
- C. <u>Completion of Development.</u> Developer agrees to substantially complete construction of the Project not later than eighteen (18) months following commencement of construction of the Project, subject to the *force majeure* provisions of Article VII herein.
- D. <u>Equal Business Opportunity Compliance.</u> Developer shall demonstrate good faith efforts to comply with the City's MWDBE (Minority/Women/Disadvantaged Business Enterprise) program in the construction of the City Improvements.
- E. <u>Buy/Hire Local Compliance.</u> In the construction of the City Improvements, Developer shall demonstrate good faith efforts, to the extent legally permissible, to comply with a "Buy Local" goal of not less than twenty-five percent (25%) local sourcing of services procured through vendors and/or service providers with offices within the United States Office of Management and Budget "metropolitan statistical area" of the City.
- F. <u>Easements and Rights-of-Way.</u> All public water, sewer, and drainage facilities shall be constructed within City or public easements or rights-of-way. All public road improvements shall be constructed in City or public rights-of-way.

- G. <u>Joint Referral Committee Process.</u> Concurrently with the negotiation of this Agreement, Developer and the City's Joint Referral Committee of its Public Works and Engineering Department have been cooperating to implement the abandonment, sale, and conveyance of the easements, rights-of-way and property necessary to complete the Project and the City Improvements. The Parties agree to use commercially reasonable efforts to complete the Joint Approval Committee process in a time and manner that allows the performance of this Agreement according to its terms.
- Ownership, Operation, and Maintenance. Η. As the acquisition and construction of each integral stage of the City Improvements is completed and each integral stage of the City Improvements becomes operational, Developer shall convey all such City Improvements to the City (including rights-of-way). As construction of each integral stage of the City Improvements is completed, City representatives shall inspect the same and, if the City finds that the same has been completed in accordance with the final plans and specifications, or any modifications thereof, and in accordance with all applicable laws, rules, and regulations, the City will accept the same, whereupon such portion of the City Improvements shall be operated and maintained by the City at its sole expense. The Parties intend this paragraph to constitute a conditional acceptance of the City Improvements by the City for purposes of qualifying the construction of the City Improvements for exemption from the imposition of sales and use taxes to the maximum extent possible.
- I. Records and Audit. Developer shall be responsible for maintaining records of amounts paid to construct the City Improvements and evidence of such payments and shall make such records available to the City at the City's reasonable request. Developer agrees to provide to the City prior to the Reimbursement Date its computation of the City Improvements Cost incurred by Developer as of the Reimbursement Date; provided, Developer shall have the right after the Reimbursement Date to notify the City of any adjustments to the City Improvements Cost. The City may audit the calculation of the City Improvements Cost at its own expense.

ARTICLE VI CITY COMMITMENTS

A. Reimbursement Fund. The City hereby covenants and agrees upon the Effective Date of this Agreement to create a special fund ("Reimbursement Fund") for the benefit of Developer for the purpose of paying Developer the Maximum Reimbursement Amount. Following Developer's fulfilling the funding conditions in Article IV hereof, the City shall deposit the Reimbursement Amount into the Reimbursement Fund pursuant to this Agreement. The Reimbursement Fund shall always remain unencumbered by the City and segregated from all other funds of the City. Such funds are held in trust by the City for Developer to be used in accordance with the terms hereof as long as Developer is in compliance with this Agreement. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the City agrees that: (i) it will not pledge or apply the

Reimbursement Fund to any other purpose or payment of any obligation of the City except for the obligations arising under this Agreement; (ii) it will not commingle the Reimbursement Fund with any other funds of the City; (iii) it will not take any action or omit to take any action that will affect the continued existence of the Reimbursement Fund or the availability for deposit therein of the Reimbursement Amount; and (iv) it will direct the investment of the Reimbursement Fund in accordance with Texas law applicable to investment of funds by municipalities. The Reimbursement Fund shall be used only to pay the Reimbursement Amount to the Developer.

B. <u>City Commitments.</u>

- Calculation of Reimbursement Amount; Deposit of Reimbursement 1. Amount. For each calendar year during the Term of this Agreement, the City shall determine the Reimbursement Amount in cooperation with the Developer and the State Comptroller. The City shall calculate the Reimbursement Amount as: (i) the incremental increase above the Base Property Tax of the City's portion of the ad valorem taxes on the value of the Property, as certified by the Harris County Appraisal District and (ii) Sales Tax Revenues in excess of the Base Sales Tax received by the City each calendar quarter from the State Comptroller. The Parties acknowledge that the City may not receive sufficient information from the State Comptroller to determine the Sales Tax Revenues until fifteen (15) or more days into the subsequent month. Based upon the City's quarterly calculation of the sales and use taxes derived from the Project, the City agrees to deposit the sales and use tax portion of the Reimbursement Amount into the Reimbursement Fund within thirty (30) business days following receipt from the State Comptroller. Based upon the City's annual calculation of the ad valorem taxes derived from the Property, the City agrees to deposit the ad valorem tax portion of the Reimbursement Amount into the Reimbursement Fund within thirty (30) business days following certification by the Harris County Appraisal District.
- 2. <u>Confidential Information</u>. The City hereby designates this Agreement as a Revenue Sharing Agreement, thereby entitling the City to request sales tax information from the State Comptroller, pursuant to section 321.3022, Texas Tax Code, as amended. Unless determined otherwise by the Texas Attorney General, in writing, any information received relating to the sales tax shall be considered confidential proprietary financial information not subject to immediate release to the public. The City shall seek a written opinion from the Texas Attorney General, raising any applicable exception to release, prior to any release to a third-party under the Texas Public Information Act, and City shall provide Developer timely notice and an opportunity to review and comment on any such opinion request.
- 3. <u>Maintenance of Records</u>. The City shall maintain complete books and records showing deposits to and disbursements from the Reimbursement Fund, which books and records shall be deemed complete if kept in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles as applied to Texas municipalities. Such books and records shall be available for examination by the duly authorized officers or agents of Developer during normal business hours upon request made not less than five (5) business days prior to the date of such examination. The City shall maintain such

books and records throughout the Term of this Agreement and store the same for four (4) years thereafter. Developer shall, upon not less than five (5) business days prior written notice, have the right to review and audit such books and records at its own expense.

4. Payment of Reimbursement Amounts. Beginning on the Reimbursement Date and continuing each quarter throughout the Term of this Agreement, the City shall pay the Reimbursement Amount due to Developer within forty-five (45) days following the end of the month for which sales and use taxes and ad valorem taxes are received by the City and deposited into the Reimbursement Fund, pursuant to this Agreement ("City Commitment"). The City Commitment is an unconditional obligation of payment by the City (but solely from the Reimbursement Fund), if the Project and Property generates sales and use taxes and ad valorem taxes. Such payments are not subject to any reduction, whether offset or otherwise.

ARTICLE VII DEFAULT AND REMEDY; FORCE MAJEURE

A. <u>Developer Events of Default</u>

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Developer's failure to comply with and satisfy any of the conditions and obligations under this Agreement with which Developer must comply or satisfy to receive the Reimbursement Amount shall be deemed an event of default, whereupon the City shall deliver written notice to Developer detailing such event(s) of default. If such event(s) of default is not cured within sixty (60) days following the date of Developer's receipt of the City's written notice, then the City shall not be obligated to pay to Developer the amount of the Reimbursement Amount proportionate to the period of time during which the default(s) remains uncured as measured in, for sales and use taxes, each full fiscal quarter and for ad valorem taxes, each full month(s) of the calendar year during which the default remains uncured. Alternatively, the City may terminate this Agreement by written notice to Developer, and its obligation to make any payments to Developer shall be null and void as of the date of such written notice.

B. <u>City Events of Default</u>

The City's failure to perform any of its obligations in substantial compliance with this Agreement (except for its obligation to pay Developer, with which the City shall strictly comply) shall be deemed an event of default, whereupon Developer shall deliver written notice to the City detailing such event(s) of default. If such event(s) of default is not cured within sixty (60) days following the date of the City's receipt of Developer's written notice, then Developer shall have all rights and remedies to which it is entitled under this Agreement and under all applicable laws.

C. Remedies Cumulative

- (1) In addition to the remedies provided for in paragraphs A and B of this Article VII, the non-defaulting Party may seek any remedy available under all applicable laws, in any court of competent jurisdiction, subject to paragraph G of Article VIII herein. Unless provided otherwise herein, no action taken pursuant to this Agreement shall constitute an election of remedies, and all remedies set forth in this Agreement shall be cumulative and non-exclusive of any other remedy either set forth herein or available at law or in equity. The non-defaulting Party shall have the affirmative obligation to mitigate its damages in the event of a default by the defaulting Party.
- (2) Notwithstanding the foregoing, the City Attorney is hereby authorized to negotiate and enter into amendments and revisions to this Agreement in the event of default by either Party which has not been cured after notice and opportunity to cure.
- (3) The Parties' right and authority to pursue any remedies for default under this Agreement shall survive the amendment, revision, expiration, or termination of this Agreement.

D. Waiver of Immunity

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary herein, the City and Developer hereby acknowledge and agree that this Agreement is subject to the provisions of Subchapter I of Chapter 271, Texas Local Government Code, as amended. The City agrees that its immunity from suit is waived for the purpose of adjudicating a claim for breach of this Agreement, which is subject to the terms and conditions of Subchapter I of Chapter 271, Texas Local Government Code, as amended.

E. Force Majeure

Notwithstanding anything in this Agreement which is or may appear to be to the contrary, if the performance by either Party of any covenant or obligation hereunder (specifically excluding any monetary obligations) is delayed as a result of circumstances which are beyond the reasonable control of such Party, the time for such performance shall be extended by the amount of time of such delay. Such circumstances include, without limitation, pending or threatened litigation; acts of God; war; acts of civil disobedience; fire or other casualty; shortage of materials; adverse weather conditions (such as, by way of illustration and not limitation, severe rain storms, below-freezing temperatures, hurricanes, or tornadoes); and labor actions, strikes or similar acts. The Party claiming delay of performance as a result of a *force majeure* event shall deliver written notice of the commencement of such delay not later than seven (7) days after the claiming Party becomes aware of the same, and if the claiming Party fails to so notify the other Party of delay caused by a *force majeure* event, the claiming Party shall not be entitled to extend the time for performance as provided herein.

ARTICLE VIII GENERAL PROVISIONS

- A. <u>Time of the Essence.</u> Time is of the essence in the performance of this Agreement.
- B. <u>Notices.</u> Any notice sent under this Agreement (except as otherwise expressly required) shall be written and mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, or sent by rapid transmission with written confirmation, or personally delivered to an officer of the receiving Party with written confirmation of acceptance, to the following:

Notice shall be deemed to have been received on the date such notice is personally delivered or three (3) days from the date such notice is mailed or sent by rapid transmission. Either Party may change its address by written notice as provided herein. Any communication addressed and mailed as provided herein shall be deemed to be given when so mailed, any notice so sent by rapid transmission shall be deemed to be given when receipt of such transmission is acknowledged, and any communication so delivered in person shall be deemed to be given when received signed for by an authorized officer, of Developer or the City, or his or her designee, as applicable.

- C. <u>Amendment and Waiver.</u> A provision of this Agreement may be amended or waived if such amendment or waiver is in writing and is approved by Developer and the City. No course of dealing on the part of Developer or the City, nor any failure or delay by Developer or the City with respect to exercising any right, power or privilege pursuant to this Agreement, shall operate as a waiver thereof, except as otherwise provided herein.
- D. <u>Severability.</u> Should any of the provisions contained in this Agreement be held unenforceable in any respect, such unenforceability shall not affect any other provisions of this Agreement, and all provisions, covenants, agreements or portions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.
- E. <u>Successors and Assigns.</u> Developer may assign all or part of its rights (including the right to receive payments), duties, and obligations under this Agreement to any lender, investor, escrow agent, affiliate, subsidiary, or related party of Developer, or an owner or tenant of the Project.
- F. <u>Headings.</u> All titles or headings in this Agreement are only for the convenience of the Parties and shall not be construed to have any effect or meaning as to the agreement between the Parties hereto. Any reference herein to an article, section, subsection, or paragraph shall be considered a reference to such article, section, subsection, or paragraph of this Agreement unless otherwise stated. Any reference herein to an exhibit shall be considered a reference to the applicable exhibit attached hereto unless otherwise stated.
- G. <u>Governing Law.</u> This Agreement is a contract made under, and shall be construed in accordance with and governed by, the laws of the United States of America and the State of Texas, and any actions concerning this Agreement shall be brought in either the Texas State Courts of Harris County, Texas or the United States District Court for the Southern District of Texas.
- H. <u>Approval by the Parties.</u> Whenever this Agreement requires or permits approval or consent to be given by either Party, the Parties agree that such approval or consent shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.
- I. <u>Counterparts.</u> This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original and all of which shall constitute the same agreement.
- J. <u>Interpretation.</u> This Agreement has been negotiated jointly by the Parties and shall not be construed against a Party because that Party may have assumed primary responsibility for the drafting of this Agreement.
- K. <u>Conflicts with Ordinances.</u> The City and Developer agree that any City ordinance, or regulation by any other agency over which the City has control, whether heretofore or hereafter adopted, that addresses matters that are addressed by this

Agreement shall not be enforced by the City or the other regulatory agency within the Property, and that the provisions of this Agreement govern development of the Property.

Conceptual Site Plan for Project.



Depiction of Project Landscaping


