MAKE AN EMERGENCY PLAN

YOUR PLAN

- Keep relatives and friends informed of your well being
- Determine how you will keep yourself and your pets safe
- Stock up on water, food, and medication
- Identify a safe room in your house to ride out the storm
- Identify an evacuation route

PREPARING YOUR HOME

- Install safety features (smoke detectors, carbon monoxide, etc.)
- Post emergency numbers in plain view.
- Know how and when to turn off electricity and water if needed.

BUILD AN EMERGENCY KIT

Go Bag

- Copies of your important phone numbers
- Prescriptions & Medications
- Flashlight
- Toiletries & Clothes
- Cell phone charger
- Food, Water, & Snacks
- Masks and hand sanitizer

STAY AT HOME KIT

- Water & Food (7 days)
- Flashlights / tools
- Plastic tarps
- Fire extinguisher
- Camp stove / Sterno
- Plywood for windows

BUILD AN EMERGENCY KIT

PET EMERGENCY KIT

- Immunization records
- Strong leash/ collar
- Pet carrier
- Current photo of pets / microchip Information
- Food & water

- Medications
- Special care items
- Infant formula
- Diapers


DO I NEED TO EVACUATE?


- ARE YOU IN AN EVACUATION ZONE?

EVACUATION ROUTES

Evaculanes

- Opened to facilitate additional traffic flow.
- First step used to alleviate traffic.



Contraflow

- Reverses traffic along major traffic thoroughfares.
- Routes:
 - I-10 to San Antonio
 - I-45 to Dallas
 - US-290 to Brenham/ Austin
 - US-59 to Nacogdoches

EVACUATION

- Evacuation is only done when removing yourself from danger is the only way to save life.
- Evacuations may be called for neighborhoods or for large areas.

- Listen for evacuation orders from officials.
- Local Media will also broadcast our message and instructions

HURRICANES

During the Hurricane

- Remain Indoors until the storm has fully passed
- Best place is an interior hallway, bathroom, or closet on the lowest level
- Shelter under something sturdy.

HURRICANE STRENGTH

| Category | Wind Speed (mph) | Damage |
|----------|------------------------|--------------|
| 1 | 74-95 | Some |
| 2 | 96-110 | Extensive |
| 3 | 111-129 | Devastating |
| 4 | 130-156 | Catastrophic |
| 5 | 157+ | Catastrophic |

HURRICANES

Storm Surge

Waves of water pushed onshore by incoming hurricane

Hurricane Wind

 Devastating winds that can compromise structures and bring down power lines

- Hurricane Watch- Issued when Hurricane force winds (>74mph) are about 48 hours away
- When Hurricane-force winds are 36 hours out.
- Storm Surge Watch Possibility of life threatening storm surge in 48 hours
- Storm Surge Warning danger of life-threatening storm surge in 36 hours



SEVERE WEATHER

Thunderstorms

 A storm containing lightning caused by unstable air.

- Severe Thunderstorm Watch
 - Severe thunderstorms are possible
- Severe **Thunderstorm** Warning – Severe thunderstorms are imminent or occurring





SEVERE WEATHER

Flooding

- Flash Flooding is caused by heavy, quick rainfall over an area.
- Know your flood threat and take appropriate action

- Flash Flood Watch Conditions exist for Flash Flooding
- Flood Watch (Areal or Point) Conditions exist for flooding
- Flash Flood Warning –
 Flash flooding is occurring
- Flood Warning (Areal or Point Flooding is occurring



SEVERE WEATHER

Tornadoes

- Formed by rotating thunderstorms.
- Can form relatively quickly and cause extensive damage
- Rated based on their damage from EF-0 to EF-5

- Tornado Watch Conditions exist for **Tornadoes**
- Tornado Warning A tornado has been spotted or detected on Radar
- Tornado Emergency— A tornado has been spotted and is an active threat to human life.

BEFORE SEVERE WEATHER

- Purchase Flood Insurance
- Find Bayous and creeks near your house
- Get Weather Alerts

DURING SEVERE WEATHER

- Stay informed
- Get to Safety
 - Safest place is inside a sturdy structure
 - Interior room with no windows



- Turn Around, Don'tDrown
- It only take 12
 inches of moving
 water to float a car,
 6 inches to knock
 you over.



TEMPERATURE EMERGENCIES

Heat Emergencies

- Excessive heat can cause dehydration, heat stroke, and death.
- Keep cool and stay hydrated.
- Check on neighbors/ family

AFTER THE DISASTER - RECOVERY

Returning Home

- Wait for official instructions to return.
- Be prepared to be without basic utilities and services for some time.
- Disasters can cause damage to homes and create safety hazards.
- Discard all food that has been left unrefrigerated or has been damaged.

Assistance

 Depending on the size and scale of the emergency, some disaster assistance may be available from FEMA and other agencies.

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

- COORDINATES THE ACTIVITY OF ALL CITY DEPARTMENTS
- ACTIVATES THE EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER WHERE MAYOR TURNER PROVIDES DIRECTION AND GUIDANCE
- TRACKS THE STORMS, RAINFALL TOTALS, WATER LEVELS, HIGH WATER LOCATIONS, CENTERPOINT OUTAGES, & AIRPORT DELAYS
- COORDINATES THE EVACUATION HUB, REFUGE OF LAST RESORTS, AND MASS SHELTERING
- WORK CLOSELY WITH POLICE, FIRE, PUBLIC WORKS ON RESCUE OPERATIONS
