AUTOMOTIVE BUSINESS LICENSES ISSUED

- Auto Repair Facility
 - Both body shops and mechanics
- Mobile Auto Repair Business
- Motor Vehicle Dealer
- Retail Supply Dealer
 - Sellers of auto parts and accessories, such as O'Reilly or Wal-Mart
 - Convenience stores are excluded
- Used Parts and Used Accessory Dealer
- Automotive Parts Rebuilder

AUTOMOTIVE BUSINESS LICENSES ISSUED

- License requirements are found in Chapter 8 of the Code of Ordinances
- Some business fall under state regulation also

AUTO REPAIR FACILITY OVERSIGHT

- Section 8-16 defines an auto repair facility as follows:
 - Any person who engages in, conducts or carries on the public business of repairing motor vehicles or motor vehicle trailers, or both. This term includes a mobile automotive repair business.

AUTO REPAIR FACILITY OVERSIGHT

- The following businesses are included:
 - Mechanics, including those attached to franchise car dealerships
 - Body shops
 - Tire shops
 - Oil change facilities
 - Window tint facilities
 - Installers of stereos or other accessories
- Inspection stations are not included, as they are overseen by the state
 - Unless the service includes repairs such as oil changes

AUTO REPAIR FACILITY OVERSIGHT

- Some businesses will require more than one license.
- For example, tire shops also need a Retail Supply Dealer license as they sell tires in addition to installing them. If they sell used tires, then they need a Used Parts and Used Accessory Dealer license.

COMMON AUTO REPAIR FACILITY VIOLATIONS

- No ARF license (Sec. 8-51)
- Facility requirements such as parts on the ground, high weeds, no all-weather surface, and oil on the ground (Sec. 8-30)
- Keeping cars for more than 30 days without surrounding the shop with a solid fence (Sec. 8-30)
- Failure to keep records as required (Sec. 8-27)

REGULATORY OPPORTUNITIES

- Citations may be issued for violations
- For persistent, uncorrected violations by a licensed business, Auto Dealers can take the business before the Automotive Board.
- For businesses with no license who continue to operate, a citation can be issued each day the business is in violation.

REGULATORY CHALLENGES

- Some businesses appear unmoved by citations and include as part of operating expense.
- Businesses with no license are unable to be brought before the Automotive Board for consideration of license removal because the business already has no license.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Bring to table all regulatory parties/stakeholders to assist with enforcement, including non-City partners.
- Review City of Houston Code of Ordinances, Chapter 8 for opportunities to add additional language to assist with regulation.
