## **FLOCK ALPR Camera Proposal**

- COH plans to lease FLOCK ALPR cameras at various locations to help combat violent crime
- Several City Council members have contributed funds to lease cameras for year 1 of the proposed 5 year contract
- Contract is planned for City Council presentation on August 17, 2022



### Main ALPR Model

### FLOCK Flex:

Solar powered ALPR Camera: 8.75"L x 5"H x 2.875"W

Can also be connected to 120AC power if necessary



## **Optional ALPR Model**

FLOCK Falcon Flex: Highly portable

Rechargeable battery powered ALPR Camera



Battery power for up to 30,000 reads before requiring a recharge.


## Houston Area FLOCK ALPR use

## **ALPR Camera Functionality Requirements**

- Cameras must recognize license plates from all 50 states, District of Columbia, US Territories, Canada, and Mexico in daylight and darkness
- Must capture readable license plates at speeds up to 100 MPH
- Camera range is 15ft to 100ft distance
- Accuracy of license plate reads must meet or exceed 95% in typical field trials




## **ALPR Success Story**

**ALPR Success Story** 

#### Crime Suppression Team Uses ALPR To Locate Wanted Murder Suspect

In June of 2022, the Clear Lake CST was tasked with locating a wanted murder suspect. Through research and fieldwork, the team developed a vehicle, belonging to the suspect's wife. The suspect was previously listed as the driver, on a prior accident report. The CST added the vehicle to a "Custom Hotlist" on the Flock Safety ALPR system and within minutes received a hit near the Port of Houston. As more alerts came in, officers developed a plan to locate the vehicle with UC surveillance. In short time, the vehicle was located, and the wife was observed to be the sole occupant. After a few hours of rolling surveillance, the wife drove to a gas station in Pearland, where she met with the suspect. Officers were able to take him into custody without incident.



### **ALPR Stolen Vehicles Success**

**ALPR Success Story** 

#### Northeast CST – Frequently Locating Stolen Vehicles

By utilizing Flock Safety's NCIC and Custom Hotlist alerts, the Northeast Crime Suppression Team is consistently locating stolen vehicles:

July 1st, located two separate stolen vehicles which had been parked; possibly to be utilized at a later time. After surveilling, vehicles were recovered. Two separate incidents.





July 8<sup>th</sup>, located a rolling stolen vehicle, observed the driver park at a Family Dollar, and uniformed officers quickly took the suspect into custody; charged with UUMV.



## **ALPR Missing Juvenile Recovery**

In this example HPD officers proactively recovered a stolen vehicle, arrested a felony suspect, and most importantly located a missing (possibly trafficked) female juvenile; who they were able to return to her family.



## **ALPR** proposed costs

- ALPR Cameras are leased for \$2500 each
- Installation charge of \$250 per camera
- ALPR Cameras can be moved as needed
- Solar powered with option for 120v AC if needed
- FLOCK to provide installation hardware (pole, clamps, etc.) where necessary
- Installation schedule TBD
